USDA Urges Reduced Vegetable Production

The US Department of Agriculture today recommended that the 1970 total acreage for eight principal vegetables grown for processing be reduced by two per cent from the 1969 total

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service, in the publication "1970 Acreage-Marketing Guides, Vegetables for Commercial Processing," (AMG-72), recommends a total planting of 1,664,700 acres for the eight vegetables: lima beans, snap beans, beets, sweet corn, cucumbers for pickles, green peas, spinach, and tomatoes. For cabbage grown for sauerkraut, however, C&MS recommends an acreage equal to 1969's

The summer-fall melon planting recommendation is a two per cent reduction. Also, C&MS suggests growers reduce sweetpotato acreage two per cent

For 11 summer vegetables, the recommended changes from last year are: a 10 per cent increase in planting of early carrots, 5 per cent increases in plantings of cauliflower, early celery, late cucumbers, early onions and late tomatoes; a 10 per cent decrease in plantings of late carrots, a 7 per cent decrease in acreage of lettuce, and no change in planting of all other vegetables.

The guides for 12 fall vegetables suggest 5 per cent increases in plantings of late snap beans, early cauliflower, late lettuce, and early and late tomatoes, a 5 per cent reduction for late cucumbers, and no change in other vegetable plantings.

York Holstein Cow Gets Association Gold Medal

Holstein-Friesian Association of America reports that Gold Medal Dam status has been achieved by Pleasant Site King 4296694 (GP), bred and owned by Preston E Chronister, York.

This recognition is based on an animal's ability to transmit outstanding milk production and desirable body conformation

Pleasant Site King qualified on the basis of her classification and her qualifying Registered Holstein daughters have attained the following type and production levels, mature equivalent basis, as reported by the Holstein Association

Pleasant Site Osbornedale Pride (VG) with a single record of 21,897 lbs of milk and 896 lbs. of butterfat. Pleasant Site Fayne (GP) with a single record of 17,180 lbs of milk and 676 lbs of butterfat; and Pleasant Site Dean General (GP) with a single record of 16,023 lbs of milk and 635 lbs of butterfat.

General Cigar Raises Earnings

Edgar M Cullman, president of General Cigar Co Inc, announced the company's sales and other revenues reached a record \$246,092,000 in 1969. This compared with \$235,107,000 in 1968.

For the fourth quarter of the year sales and other revenue were \$68,072,000, another record, compared with \$62,726,000 in the same period of 1968

Net income for 1969 was \$3,427,000 or \$2.24 per share compared with \$3,236,000 or \$2.11 per share in 1968, an increase of 5.9 per cent
