Sewage Disposal Discussed Here

Two Penn State extension
agents outlined proper methods
of sewage disposal and how to
get it Monday night at the Farm
and Home Center

Dr. Milford Heddleson, of the
agronomy extension, spoke on
"Soil Types for Sewage Dispo-
sal," while N Henry Wooding,
extension engineer, outlined
"Sewage Disposal Systems"

Heddleson urged that anyone
seeking to install a septic tank
system, particularly when con-
structing a new home, check the
soil by running percolation tests.

He outlined types of soil, and
cautioned against soils which
are too porous and could allow
effluent to run off too quickly
into water systems

On the other extreme, he said
that soils which are too shallow
and contain underlying shale or
clay which are constantly wet,
also can cause problems

Another important factor is
the direction effluent will flow,
on the surface as well as beneath
the soil structure

Wooding outlined proper meth-
ods of septic tank construction
and emphasized proper rates of
filtration in the soil, the only
purifying element

Septic tanks and drain fields
should be at least 10 feet from
property lines and occupied
buildings, at least 50 feet from
streams and 100 feet from water
supplies, he said

Instructions include orders to

Be sure babysitters know the
location of at least two escape
routes

Teach older children how to
use and respect fire. They learn

tions.

house to safety in case of fire.

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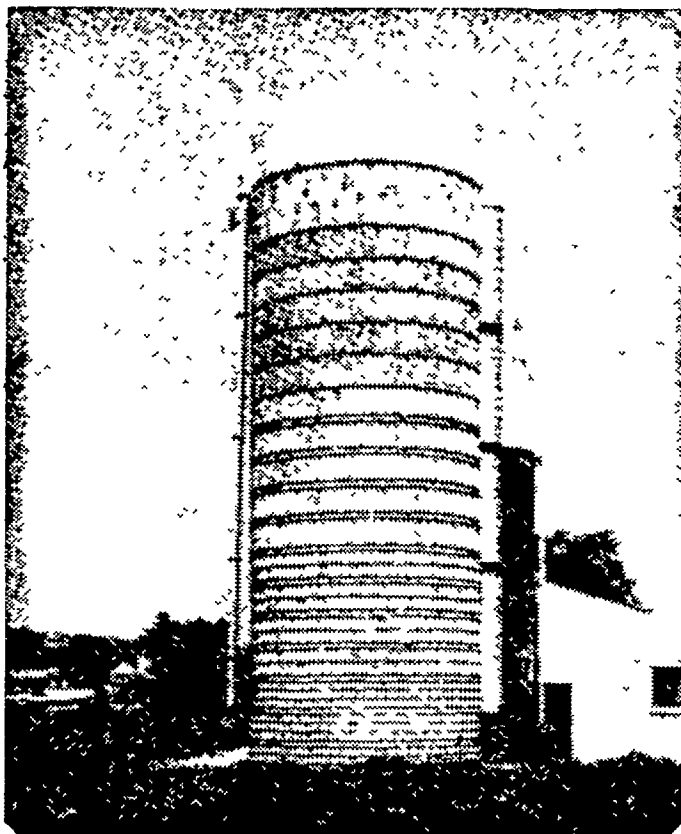
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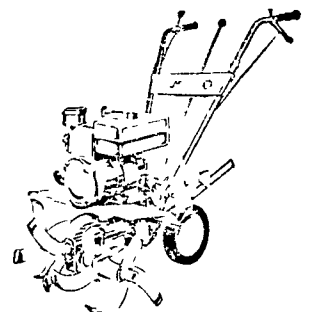
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
