Broiler Output Up 7 Per Cent

Commercial broiler production was at a record high in the U.S. last year, the USDA reported.

The 22 States that account for 97 per cent of U.S. total output produced 2.7 billion broilers, up seven per cent from a year earlier.

Gross income from broilers totaled \$1.47 billion, up nearly 16 per cent from 1968.

With average live weight per bird 3.6 pounds, compared to 3.5 pounds in 1968, the number of pounds produced, at 9.7 billion, were up eight per cent.

Output in Georgia, the Nation's leader, totaled 442 million birds, up one per cent from a year earlier.

Arkansas' output, at 415 million birds, was up six per cent; Alabama's, at 352 million, up six and one half per cent. North Carolina's production totaled 281 million, up seven per cent; Mississippi's 221 million, up nine per cent; Maryland's, 174 million, up 10 per cent; Delaware's 134 million, up 16 per cent; Texas', 171 million, up six per cent.
