Bryncoed Farms Has 31 Ton Silage Output

Bryncoed Faims of Chestei Springs, with a yield of 3162 tons of 30 per cent dry matter silage per acre, have been entered in the 1969 DeKalb (Ag Research, Inc.) 30 Ton Silage Club.

Their entry was mechanically harvested and verified by an impartial third party The yield came from afield of XL-66

They used such progressive management practices as good weed and insect control, heavy fertilization and a high population hybrid to attain this yield

They planted on May 15 in 35 inch rows The fertilizer program included 170 pounds of nitrogen, 200 pounds of phos phate and 140 pounds of potash Twenty tons of manure had also been applied Weeds were controlled with Aatrex and one cuitivation

The purpose of the DeKalb 30 Ton Silage Club is to piomote idea exchange, stimulated by friendly competition, among the mation's leading silage glowers

Feed Is Major Expense Of Poultry Production


Feed is a major expense in poultry production It amounts to about 55 per cent of the total cost of producing market eggs, 65 per cent of the cost of producing meat-type birds, and 55 per cent of the cost of producing hatching eggs

The age and breeding of chickens determine their puichase price Highest purchase prices are charged for ready-tolay pullets Day-old sexed pullet chicks sell for 25 to 30 per cent of the cost of ready-to-lay pullets of the same breeding

Normal expenses of a farm flock - in addition to feed and birds - include housing, equipment, vaccines and drugs, fuel, electricity, labor, taxes, interest, and depreciation

Accurate records are essential in figuring costs and determining efficiency Records also Box 96, Ephrata, Pa. can be used to improve operations.
