

Weekly Poultry Report

Eastern Pennsylvania And New Jersey

Prices of light type hens continued to decline with top of the range 1c lower. Demand light and unaggressive as many buyers finding difficulty in scheduling slaughter during the next several weeks as most plants booked to capacity for the balance of the month. Offerings continue heavy and in excess of needs. Offerings on heavy type hens limited but generally short of a light interest. Prices paid at farm: Light Type Hens: 7-8½ M 8c Heavy Type Hens: Tfewr.

New York Eggs

Prices about steady and unchanged on large and mediums. Trading activity light. Receipts restricted to lighter needs or arriving on consignment. Jumbos occasionally short of full needs. Large whites plentiful with occasional offerings to nearby plants at 35½ cents left unsold. Extra large demand decreased and stocks more readily available with street sales noted at 37-39½ mostly 37½-38½c. Mediums irregularly distributed but ample for local needs. Supplies of browns light. Smalls tending to accumulate under light local demand, full loads occasionally short for export requirements. Carton movement fairly good with best interest noted for the heavier weights.

New Meat Law To Be Reviewed

The new Meat Inspection Act will be discussed by state meat and marketing specialists at 8 p.m. Friday, April 24 at the Farm and Home Center basement meeting room.

H. Louis Moore, Penn State extension marketing specialist will discuss the application of inspection standards to existing plants.

Dr. Everett Denlinger, superintendent of meat hygiene, Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, will talk about details of the various regulations under the new act.

Max Smith, county agent, said the information "should be of particular value to local butchers, packers, meat processors, market-stand retailers, locker-plant operators and anyone connected with the meat business."

"We are aware of some confusion and misunderstanding caused by the new Meat Inspection Act. We hope that you will accept this opportunity of learning more about these regulations."

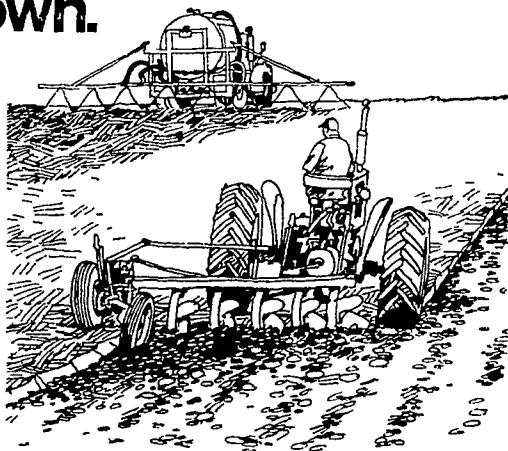

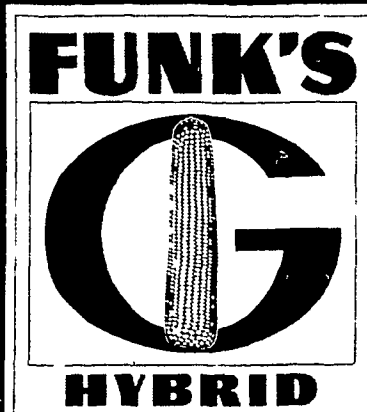
