

Local Youths Attend 4-H Capital Days

Two county 4-H members joined with 130 other Commonwealth 4-Hers to participate in State 4-H Capital Days programs in Harrisburg, April 13-14.

The youths were Diane Ruckwalter, Lititz RD3, and Jeffrey Risser, Leola RD1.

The county delegates, each with outstanding 4-H records, met with legislators at a special breakfast, observed the State House of Representatives and Senate while in session, and toured the Capitol and William Penn Memorial Museum.

At the Monday luncheon, opening remarks were made by Leland G. Jinks, State 4-H leader at The Pennsylvania State University. Master of ceremonies was Jeffrey Rantz of Carbon County.

The lawmakers served as hosts April 13 when they invited the 4-H members to 'sit in' while in session. Orientation programs were conducted by Senator Elmer D. Hawbaker, representing the 33rd District, and Representative Sherman L. Hill, representing the 6th District.

At the Monday evening banquet, two political leaders discussed the topic 'Politics for Young People.' Speakers were Craig Tuva, past Republican state chairman, and Otis Moore, former Democratic state chairman.

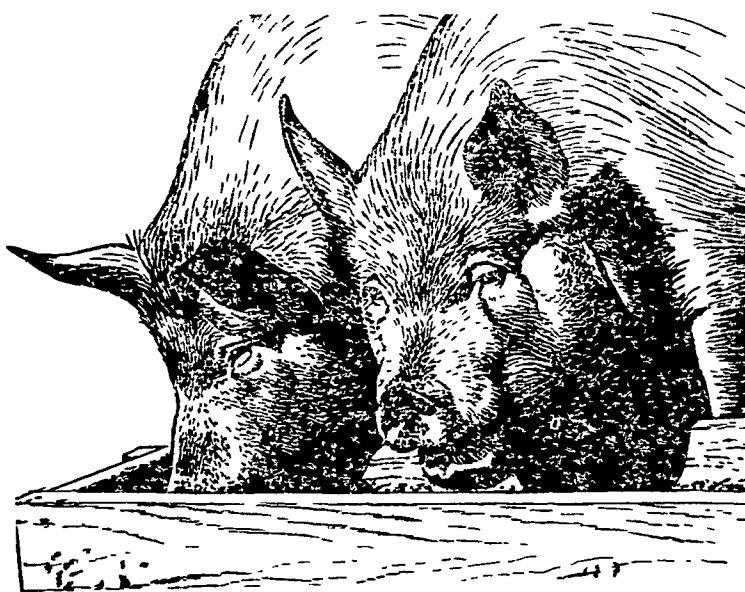

The Programmed Hog was conceived a decade ago. But because of the high standards we set for this program, it was not born until just last fall in time to be introduced in the 70's.
