Teat Dipping
Is it a management tool or crutch? Don't allow teat dipping

to become a "crutch" to replace good management in your herd. Research on teat dipping following each milking with a chlorine or iodine disinfectant plus dry cow treatment with antibiotics, looks very promising as a control for mastitis.

However, the dairyman who looks good management, milking procedure and equipment to lean on teat dipping as a management crutch, a head of a disaster. It is a disease resulting from mismanagement. High milk production has been associated with mastitis.

Cost of Replacements

How much is a yearling two year old heifer costs to raise? Would it compare to dairy herds?

Dairymen with accurate records say \$300, plus the genetic value of the animal when born. The \$300 represents the actual cost of raising the animal. The genetic value added to the cost of raising a heifer replacement varies widely among herds. The usual value is between \$100 and \$200, so the total value for a heifer ranges between \$400 and \$500.

However, the dairyman who needs a fresh heifer as a heifer replacement can afford to add \$150 to the cost price as that's what a good animal will make for him as labor management income the first year in his herd.

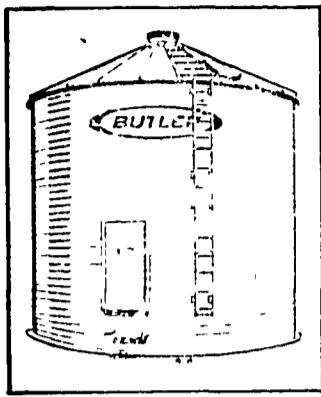
R. Clair Murphy was installed as Assistant Steward and Alfred Wanner Sr. as a member of the Executive Committee.

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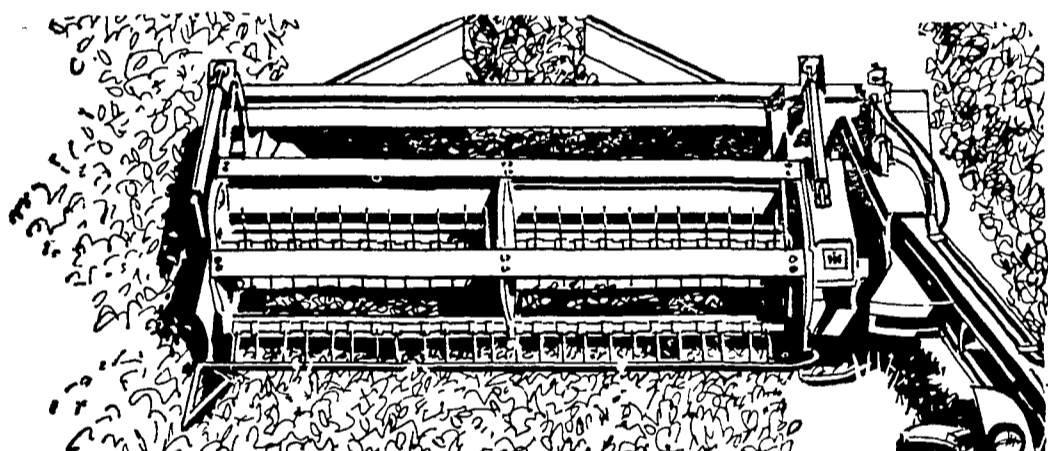
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
