

Manor FFA Holds Banquet

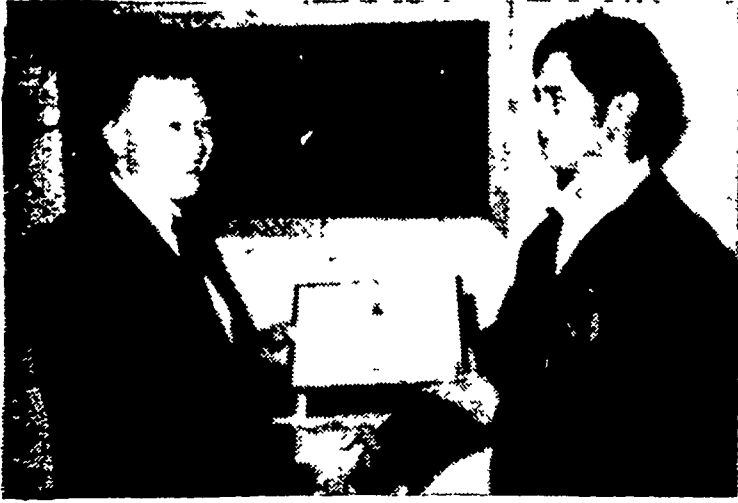
Philip Stehman, Conestoga RD2, received the DeKalb Agricultural award at Manor's annual FFA banquet recently at West Willow Fire Hall.

Glenn Rohrer and Steve Brenemen won the hunting contests.

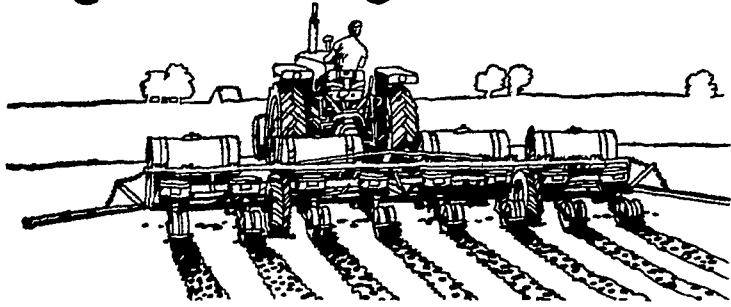
The Creed Contest winner was Bill Landis. Runners-up were Mark Wagner, Jay Risser, Dennis Landis and Glenn Newcomer.

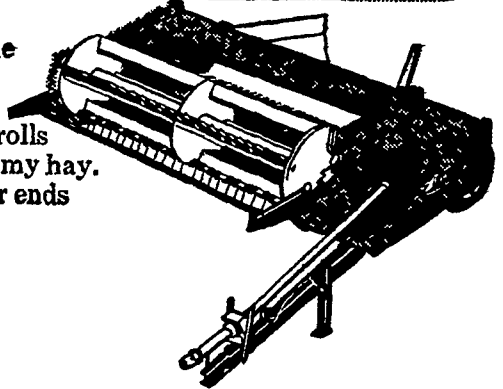
