Summaries

Wheat Can Replace 30 to 50% Of Corn in Livestock Rations

From a nutritional standpoint, wheat can be used in beef, hog and dairy feeds if fed in a properly balanced ration, say North Carolina State University specialists.

Wheat can replace between 30 to 50 per cent of the corn or milo in the beef ration and up to 50 per cent of the corn in hog or dairy rations.

Relative feeding values vary with the quality of grain and the kind of animal fed. Good quality wheat is about 25 to 30 per cent higher in protein than corn but contains less starch or carbohydrates. Recent amino acid analysis of Blueboy wheat indicates crude protein to be 12.83 per cent, compared with 9.9 per cent for yellow dent corn.

Wheat is lower than corn in calcium and vitamin A but about twice as high in available phosphorus, vitamin B and other critical amino acids.

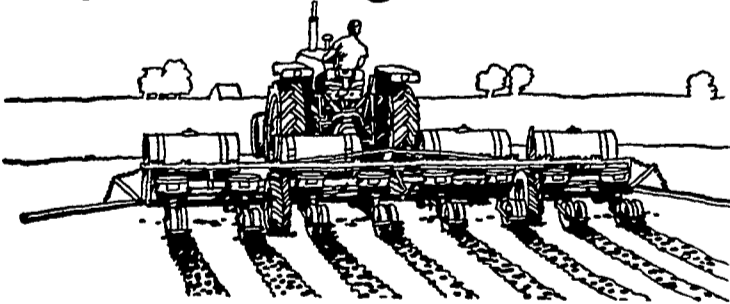
The economics of feeding wheat are favorable. It has a heavier weight — 60 pounds per bushel compared to corn's 56 pounds. Wheat is generally regarded as being worth about 12 per cent more than corn on a pound-for-pound basis when fed to beef cattle and hogs, and eight per cent more for dairy cattle.

Animal husbandry specialists encourage use of wheat in livestock rations, but warn that any change in present rations should be made gradually.

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
