One of the world's largest counting jobs began in April—The Census of Population and Housing of The United States.

Fewer than four million people were counted in the first census in 1790—less than one fiftieth of the number likely to be included in the 1970 census

Most data on characteristics and housing (such as occupation income, education, migration, place of work and birth) is obtained through sampling, but everyone will be asked about age, sex, race, marital status and relationship to the head of the household

Officials at federal, state and local levels, private entrepreneurs, researchers, and many others will be anxiously awaiting the 1970 Census results

The scope of our nation's problems and the patterns of economic and social activity require reliable data for analysis, determination of trends, estimations, and predictions. The need for planning and for accurate and complete information is obvious, according to the USDA

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## Penn State Eyes Work Insurance for Laborers

Economists and sociologists at Penn State are undertaking a study on the possible effects of making unemployment insurance compulsory for farm workers

The current Congress has been considering the compulsory insurance for employees of large farms, and it is possible, government officials believe, that some national legislation of this type will be passed in the future

The Penn State study is designed to help farm leaders, legislators and economists understand what effect, if any, such insurance might have on the labor situation on the farm in Pennsylvania

A mailed questionnaire to 1,500 farm owners and operators and 1,700 interviews with workers will be conducted

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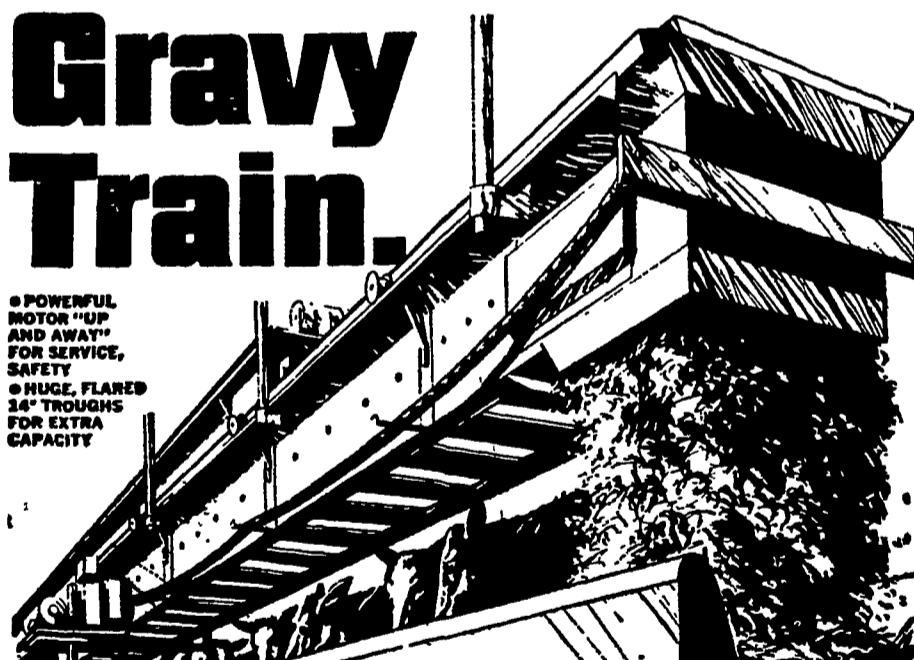
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
