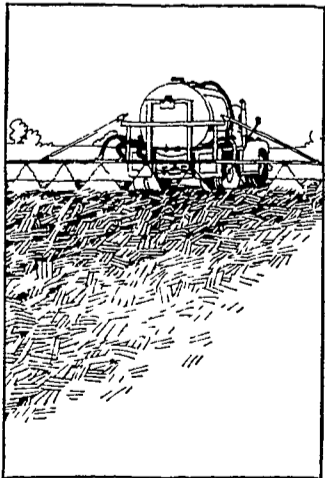

43 Carnation Growers Quit in Pennsylvania

Forty-three carnation grow-
ers in Pennsylvania quit produc-
tion in 1969, leaving a total of
241 for the state, according to
the Penn State extension ser-
vice.

In the 23 states that represen-
t about 95 per cent of the nation's
floricultural industry, there
were 127 fewer carnation grow-
ers for a new total of 1861, the
extension service said.

Carnation average national
price was shaved a little las-
year, down from 71 cents to
69 cents.

Pennsylvania's price was of-
four tenths of a cent, down to
96 cents.

There were 10 per cent more
carnations sold in 69 nationally,
but Pennsylvania carnation pro-
duction was down 8 1/2 per cent
(to 35 1/2 million blooms).

Intentions for '70? Four per-
cent fewer plants in Pennsylv-
vania. Two per cent more in the
nation.

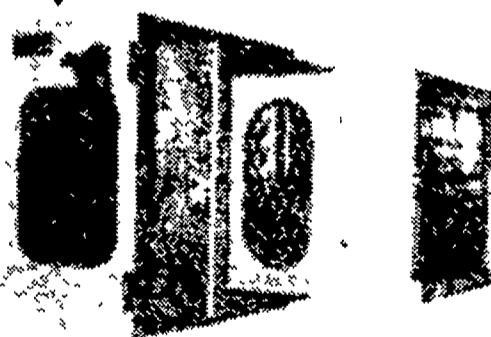
