Composting Termed Way Of Reducing Pollution

If more homeowners would learn the art of "composting", there would be considerably less trash for municipalities to collect and dispose of, says a University of Maryland horticulturist.

Each day housewives throw into garbage bags tons of fruit and vegetable scraps. Each year trash collectors are faced with the problem of discarding tons of leaves and grass clippings or other organic wastes collected by homeowners.

Dr. Francis R. Gouin, extension horticulturist, says each homeowner can play an important part in reducing his contribution to the national pollution problem.

If homeowners would learn to compost these organic wastes, there would be significantly less trash to collect and dispose of, and this means that municipalities could concentrate their efforts toward more profitable community goals.

Composting is not difficult, he says, and requires little time and space. All you need is an area no larger than four square feet. The compost may be made in a pit dug into the ground or on the surface with an enclosure of old snowfence or second-hand building materials.

To build a compost, put a 10 to 12 inch layer of organic matter (such as leaves, twigs, grass clippings, old house plants or cut flowers, trimmings from fruits and vegetables and wood ashes from your fireplace) in

the bottom of the pit or enclosure.

On top of this layer put one half to one inch of soil from the garden and a light sprinkling of lime and fertilizer. Continue building these alternate layers until your compost is complete. Keep moist and turn occasionally to hasten decomposition. Your compost will be ready to use in your garden in six months to a year.
