Mellorine can be sold only in properly labeled packages of one half gallon It cannot be dispensed and served from a softserve freezer

Parevine, a non dairy product used mostly by Jewish people, can be sold only in factory filled properly labeled one half gallon containers It may be served for consumption on the premises provided a sign or menu states that "Parevine is Served Here"

Lo-Mel may not be served in a cone, dish nor be frozen hard. The sale of Lo-Mel is rescricted to eating establishments

State Agriculture Secretary Leland H Bull said the "same high sanitation standards" required by the State Agriculture Department in the past for ice cream products will apply to the frozen dessert products


