Ready-to-cook movement spotty ranging light and disappointing to fair. Supplies ample to occasionally burdensome and freely offered in an effort to clear. Less than trucklot prices generally unchanged though trending lower within the ranges. Advance interest very limited. Live supplies fully adequate for needs. Undertone weak and unsettled.

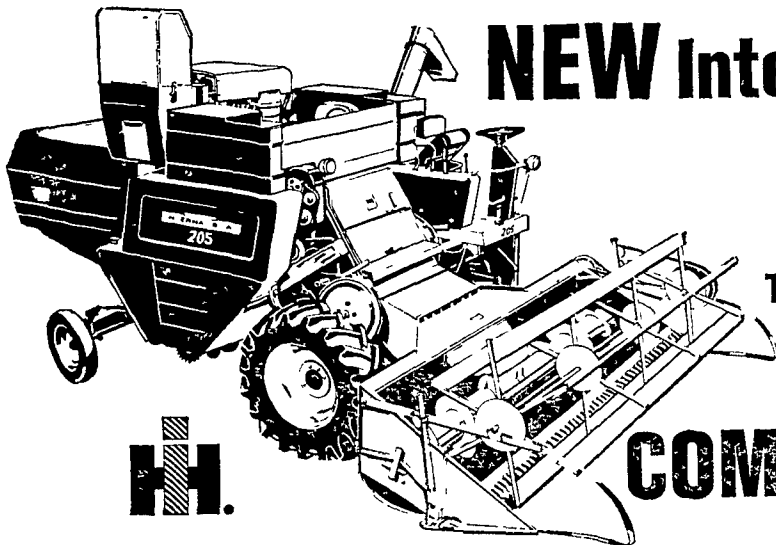
