

**Ephrata Adult Farmers Plan New Jersey Tour**

The fourth annual summer tour under the adult farmer program at Ephrata High School has been scheduled Thursday, August 6, to New Jersey.

Starting at Ephrata High School at 7:30 a.m., the group will go by bus to tour a large modern Agway feed plant at Bordentown, N.J. at 9:30 a.m. Lunch is scheduled for 11:15; a tour of the Walker Gordan Dairy Farms and Rotolactor, Plainsboro, N.J. will run from 1 to 3:15 p.m., followed by a visit to historic New Hope, dinner and the return to Ephrata.

Cost is \$450 per person for the air-conditioned bus Charles Ackley, Ephrata vo-ag teacher, is taking reservations on a first come first served basis.

**No Additional Cholera Outbreaks, But Producers Feel Market Pinch**

No additional cases of hog cholera have been uncovered in Southeastern Pennsylvania following outbreaks last week on two farms, one in Lancaster County and one in Berks County, according to Dr. Homer S. Forney, Harrisburg, chief of the miscellaneous diseases division of the Bureau of Animal Industry.

If local hog producers follow proper sanitary procedures, it appears possible the outbreak may be controlled, Dr. Forney indicated Thursday.

He said the major problem officials now are encountering is finding a market for disease free hogs in the area where the

outbreak occurred. Slaughterers are reluctant to take the animals, even when they have been tested and found to be free of the disease, Dr. Forney said.

He said there is no reason why tested animals should not be taken from these areas. When they're tested, the animals actually are safer than the average non tested animal on the market, he told Lancaster Farming.

At the same time, he advised swine producers to avoid a cholera outbreak by keeping people away from their swine, using good sanitation practices and reporting anything of a suspicious nature as soon as

possible so that a laboratory diagnosis can be made.

He noted that the surveillance quarantine for imported animals has been increased from 30 to 60 days. Recent outbreaks have occurred after the 30 day interval.

Last week, Paul M. Herr, Unicorn, lost 488 head of pigs after they were infected by swine he received from Delaware and Daniel E. Mast, Oley RD1, Berks County, lost 101 head from the same source. Last month, Alexander Jasien-ski of Chester County lost 1,348 swine, from an unrelated source.

Three other Lancaster County farms which received swine from the Delaware source were placed on surveillance quarantine by the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, but tests have not revealed cholera so far.
