Kauffmans Win Top Holstein Honors

It was a good week for Penn Springs Farm, Elizabethtown RD1, and the Robert Kauffman family.

Penn Springs animals captured two of the highest honors at the Lancaster County Black & White Show Thursday.

The farm's C Sedgrose Mary Texen, a four-year-old, took the show's top honor, the grand champion of the show. The animal was also the senior champion.

Penn Springs Bill Maid, a senior yearling, meanwhile, earned junior champion honors.

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Top Slave Brings \$12.25 an Hour

Grube of Lititz RD1 brought the hefty price of \$12.25 per hour for a minimum of an eight hour day. The money will go to the Foundation to help retire the Farm and Home Center construction debt.

Altogether, J. Everett Kleider, Quarryville RD1 auctioneer, sold 48 slaves, but most went at a

more reasonable price, around \$2 an hour.

Grube's price shot up when Balmer got into a bidding contest with Longenecker, who lives at Lititz RD3. Longenecker, who indicated afterward that he was seeking some tobacco hands, (Continued on Page 13)
