

2,000 Attend Holstein Convention

A record crowd of enthusiastic Holstein breeders numbering in excess of 2,000 attended the various activities of the 85th Annual Convention of Holstein Friesian Association of America held recently in Boston, Mass.

The 222 officially elected Delegates from each of the contiguous 48 states and Puerto Rico elected H. W. Craun, Roanoke, Virginia, as Association President and A. C. Thomson, Burlington, Illinois, Vice President.

Three new members were elected to the Board of Directors for a four-year term replacing three Directors who were ineligible for reelection under the Association's Bylaws limiting the term of Directors to two consecutive four-year terms.

Among the key attractions was an electric garden tractor, which three local farm implement companies have already stocked.

Quentin H. Smith, environmental development director, spoke on "Power Supply and the Environment."

Highlight of the Convention activities was the 16th Annual American Dairy Association Princess Contest which was held in connection with the Association's 85th Annual Banquet at the Staller Hilton Hotel.

score and descriptive information under the reclassification program being considered as official. This is a major departure within the Association's highly regarded Type program.

Convention activities were concluded with an outstanding sale of 52 animals at the Topsfield Fairgrounds at an average price of \$4,070.19. Top selling female was Hilfar Pride Janet 6870543 consigned by Mel Johnson of Hillside Farms, Cranston, Rhode Island, and purchased by Cairn Farm, Washington for \$20,500. Top selling bull at \$20,000.00 was a two-month old calf purchased by Douglas Nelson, Newport, Ver-

mont, R. A. Gould & Son, Marshfield, Vermont, and R. Dale Jones, Silver Lake, Indiana.

Another young bull, selling for \$11,000.00, was a one-month old bull calf consigned by the University of New Hampshire, and purchased for service by an artificial insemination organization in West Germany.
