top a knit jumpsuit for a unique costume. Among corduroy's virtues is its wonderful washability. When used in combination with another material, such as a crinkle vinyl, care should be taken for best laundering results. Check hang tag instructions.

Knits are everywhere in every possible fiber and blend of fibers. Rich, expensive-looking blends and synthetics turn out to be machine washable and dryable—even some of the wool-plus-something blends. For long wear and good shape retention, look for quality, follow washing instructions carefully, and launder frequently before dirt becomes embedded. Make a practice of saving how-to-wash hangtags. Mark the tag with some identification of the corresponding garment and refer to it when in doubt.

Texture adds a three-dimensional quality. Most important is the use of ribbing and cables to elongate and define shape. The ribs—spaced, broken, placed—control the pencil-slim, gently-contoured look. The brushed and nappy knits may be on white or natural grounds. Stripes are big and bold, but often toned down by powdery shades. The biggest trends are in geometric jacquards and prints in small patterns reflecting both an Eastern influence and Americana via American Indian, Inca or Aztec motifs.

Colors to watch run the tawny, gold, orange range. Bittersweet, a peppy red-orange deepens to rust and terra cotta on one end of the scale and lightens to copper and pumpkin on the other. The dusty tones, called funkies, are still in the picture. The best neutrals appear to be wheat, creamy beige and camel. Brights are clean, clear colors, not glaring.

It's a season unmatched for mixing. So study the styles, make your selections and scramble them up for the long and short of it.
