U.S. Study May Bring Crack Down On Seven Persistent Insecticides

All federally registered uses of seven insecticides — benzene hexachloride, chlordane, endrin, heptachlor, lindane, strobane-T, and toxaphene — for the protection of crops, livestock, forests and public health will be reviewed to determine whether or not a hazard exists from any registered use and to ascertain which uses are necessary for protection of human health and other essential purposes, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced recently.

The action is the latest in a series of moves by the Department designed to reduce nation-

wide use of the more persistent pesticides and thereby minimize potential pesticide hazards to people, wildlife, and the environment.

Within the past nine months, the Department has taken similar action involving DDT, aldrin, and dieldrin, also among those pesticides which do not degrade readily in the environment.

In the case of DDT, about 1,300 products were affected by the cancellations last December of all registered uses for house and garden pests, and shade tree, aquatic, and tobacco pests.

In March, the Department canceled federal registrations for all uses of aldrin and dieldrin in marshes, wetlands, and adja-

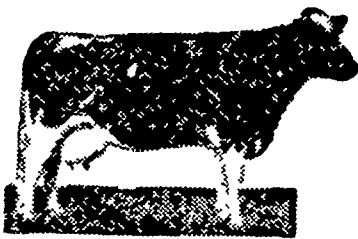

Gypsy Moth Spreads

The USDA has published a new bulletin which cites the spread of the gypsy moth into new areas of the Northeast. They are becoming an increasing threat to the commercial hardwood forests of the Appalachian mountain regions, according to the bulletin.

Gypsy moths now infest parts of Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island, Pennsylvania, and Vermont.

cent areas in an effort to further reduce pollution of water resources that support fish and other aquatic life. In May, a review of all other uses of these two compounds was announced with the general public invited to submit comments on essential uses before August 20th.

Officials of USDA's Agricultural Research Service said the purpose of the latest announcement is to notify scientists, farmers, industry, health officials, and the general public that USDA intends to review all uses of the seven named insecticides.

Persons desiring to submit written data, views, or argument regarding these registered uses should file them in triplicate with the Director, Pesticides Regulation Division, Agricultural Research Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250. All submissions must be made no later than 90 days after publication in the **Federal Register**, which was slated July 31.

In preparing views and comments, the following items should be covered: Use pattern involved including crops treated, formulations employed, and rate of application. Pests to be controlled and injury expected without the use of these chemicals. Any available test results showing the extent of environmental contamination expected from the use pattern involved. Possible substitutes now available, being tested, or efforts being made to find suitable substitutes.

The Federal Insecticide Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act requires that manufacturers register all pesticides with USDA before marketing them in interstate commerce. Registration is not granted unless pesticides are shown to be safe and effective, and the registration can be canceled if evidence becomes available to show that these requirements are not being met.
