Miss Marilyn B. Krantz of Lancaster County is the new Pennsylvania Dairy Queen.

She won the state title in competition with 21 other county winners at Harrisburg Thursday night.

Beside winning the state crown, the 17-year-old Marilyn was voted Miss Congeniality.

The charming independent five-foot-five-and-a-half-inch lass has blue eyes and golden blonde hair.

She is the daughter of Elvin B. Krantz and the late Meda C. Dombart Krantz.

Marilyn has been carrying on her mother's duties as well as her own on the Krantz farm on Sawmill Road, New Providence RD1. She inherited her mother's talents as an artist, a good cook and housekeeper. She likes animals.

Marilyn has one sister, Carol, who is married and lives at Leola.

Other Queen titles won by Miss Krantz were 1966 Junior

4-H and 1969 Senior 4-H Queens of Lancaster County. In June she was chosen Lancaster County Dairy Princess over seven other contestants.

She has been a member of the Lancaster County 4-H Holstein Club since she was nine years old and a member of Lampeter-Strasburg Mennonite 4-H Club for six years and has served as president, secretary, treasurer and game leader. She was in their cooking club until she was 13 and in the sewing club six years. Marilyn loves horses and has had one since she was eight years old.

A senior at Solanco High School where she is taking the academic course, her favorite subject is art. She is a member of the Art Club. She attended Providence Elementary School and is active in the New Providence Mennonite Church.

Runner-up for the Pennsylvania Dairy Queen title was Faye Blessing of York County.

New Holland Fair Slated Next Week

The 39th annual New Holland Fairmen's Day Association Fair will be held on Wednesday, September 30 through Saturday, October 3.

The 4-H Baby Beef Club exhibit, show and sale, is under the direction of County Agent Max M. Smith, representing the County Agriculture Extension Service. The calves will be judged on Thursday afternoon at 1 p.m. They will be sold at the New Holland Sales Stables after being judged.

The 4-H Community Club under the direction of Arnold Lueck, Assistant County Agent, will exhibit pigs fed by club members, and they will be judged on Thursday, October 1, and sold at public auction at 2 p.m. Friday. The show is sponsored by the Rotary Club of New Holland.

Exhibit areas will include items such as grains, vegetables, fruits, flowers, domestic and fine arts, and school exhibits of clothing, needlework and prepared foods.

The Flower Show will be held in the Boy Scout Home, South Roberts Avenue.

Art and Handicraft Show will be held in the former Coffee Shop building, adjoining the theater, on East Main Street.

There will be a tent on the Earl Saudei lot for beef and pigs.

Potatoes will be displayed in the A. B. C. Groff, Inc. building. Hay, corn and tobacco will be displayed in the tent at Earl Saudei's.

The sale of the baked goods and candy will be held in the Elementary School auditorium at 12 noon Wednesday, immediately following the judging of these articles. Proceeds from the bake sale will go to the Garden Spot 4-H Sewing Club Construction Awards.

The Pet Parade at 7:30 p.m. Friday will form on Main Street between Railroad and Brummer Avenues. It will move west on Main Street to Roberts Avenue, south to Franklin, east on Franklin to Railroad Avenue, then to Main Street, east on Main to the starting point.
