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CHERRY FLUFF

Dissolve jello and add drained pineapple. While the jello sets, soak marshmallows in cream for 1 hour. Now blend cream cheese into the cream and marshmallow mixture. Add nuts and celery to marshmallow mixture. Then fold into jello which is partly set. Pour into mold.

- 1 1/2 cup graham cracker crumbs (15 squares or 1 cup)
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 cup butter melted

Combine and pat gently in bottom of long pan. Chill for one hour. White fluff—

In double boiler, combine 2 cups milk, 64 large marshmallows (8 cups small marshmallows). Melt and let cool. Mixture should be jelled. Whip 2 cups whipping cream and 1/2 teaspoon almond extract. After cream is whipped to nice consistency, blend fluff and cream mixture together, whipping until mixture is smooth. Spread fluff over crumbs. Add layer of favorite cherry or blueberry pie filling (it takes about a 24 oz jar) and cover with remaining fluff. (A few crumbs may be saved and sprinkled on top.) Completed dessert should be chilled at least two hours before serving.

FRENCH SALAD DRESSING

- 2 cups vinegar (can be diluted)
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1/4 or 1/2 teaspoon salt

Mix together and cook over a slow flame, stirring constantly.

Add 1/2 teaspoon cornstarch or flour dissolved in water. When cooled, add small amount of cream or milk, if necessary, to thin it to desired consistency.

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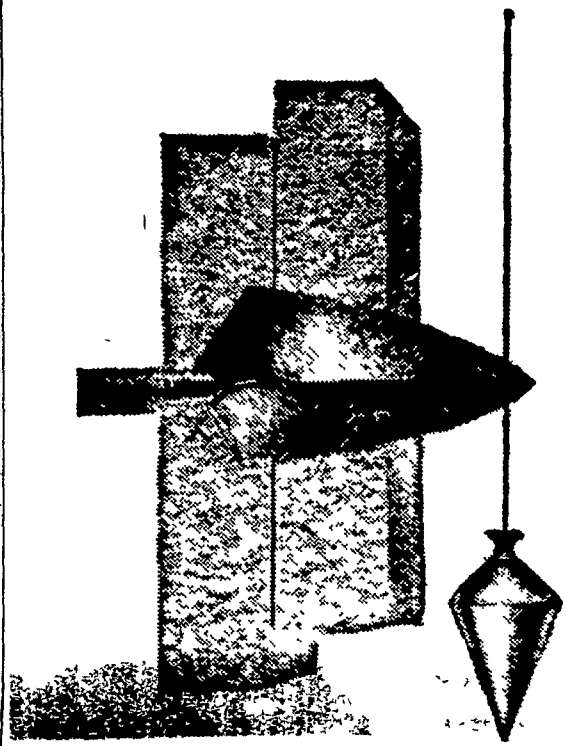
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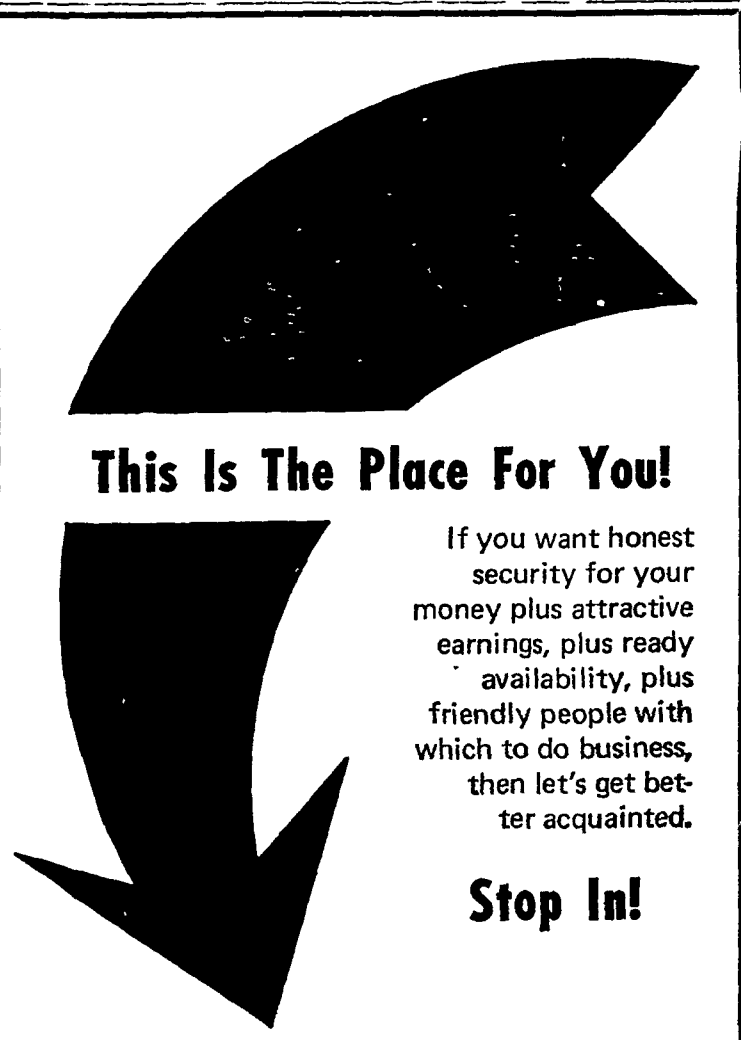
