The Welsh pony, whose original home was in the hills and valleys of Wales, survived a Henry VIII edict ordering all horses under 15 hands be destroyed.

One Test For Good Fitting Garment

Shoulder seams and side seams are shaped to follow body contours and are clues to proper fit, says Mrs. Ruth Ann Wilson, extension clothing specialist, The Pennsylvania State University. The shoulder seam should follow the highest line of the shoulder, and side seams should appear to fall straight down the sides of a garment. If side seams of the skirt swing to the back or to the front, body of the dress doesn't fit properly.

Low Heat for Cheese

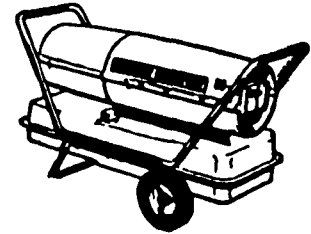
When using cheese with foods to be cooked on top of the range or in the oven, such as a casserole, use low to moderate temperatures, advise extension food and nutrition specialists. The Pennsylvania State University. To keep cheese toppings from hardening, cover the cheese with crumbs or add cheese just a few minutes before taking the casserole from the oven. If you shred or dice cheese, it will melt quickly.

Sensible Storage

Before you discard an unused household item, ask yourself why you don't use it, suggest extension home management specialists, The Pennsylvania State University. Reasons for not using it could include you haven't learned how to use it, it may need repairing, it never worked effectively, it was buried because of unhandy storage, or its value is sentimental only.

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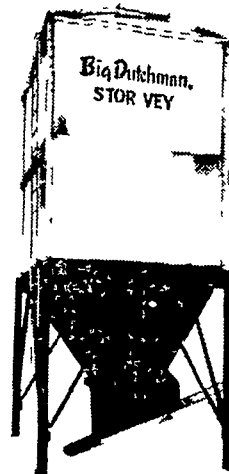
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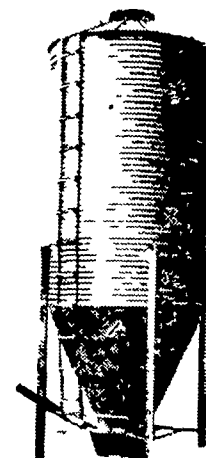
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
