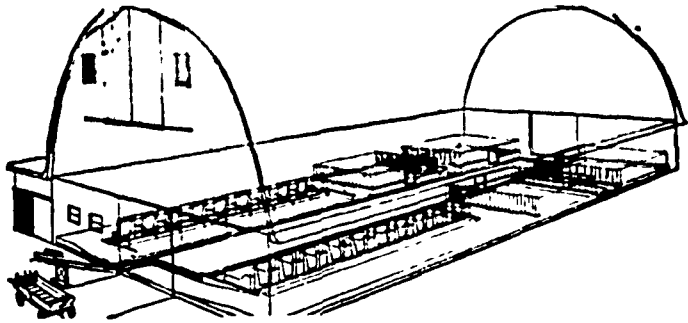

Ken Sensenig of Ephrata RD2 placed second in the Pennsylvania FFA Poultry Judging contest held at Penn State in June and was selected to be on the Pennsylvania team to compete in the national contest being held this week at the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Mo.

Jay C Zimmerman of Ephrata RD1 and Rick Pfautz of Stevens RD1 will also accompany the State delegation to Kansas City by charter bus.

Jay was awarded a trip to the National FFA Convention for

Phil Ogline, county FFA advisor and vo-ag teacher at Garden Spot High School, presented Jay with his Star Farmer trophy. Ogline discussed county FFA activities and the importance of agriculture.

Carl Graybill, Cloister FFA ad-

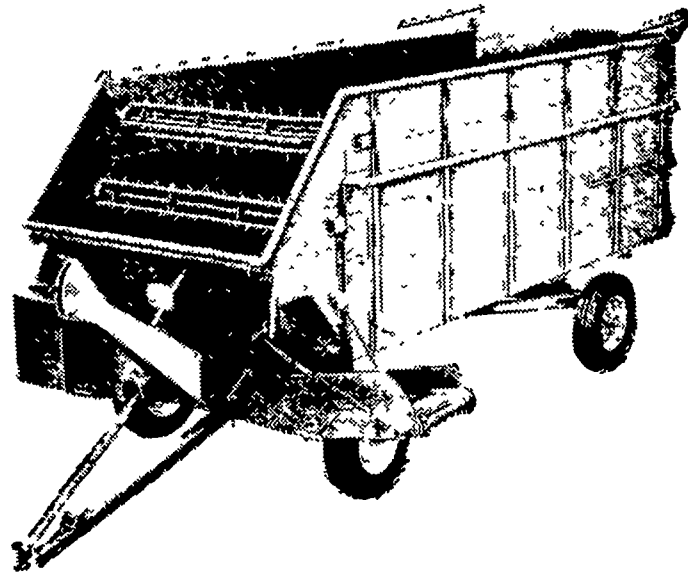
visor, and Cliff Grube, Warwick FFA advisor, were present and introduced their FFA Chapter members and discussed chapter activities.

Imitation Margarine

Among the margarines today are cartons labeled "imitation margarine." This margarine is marked "low-calorie" and with more emphasis than the word "imitation." The list of ingredients as required by law tells the story, points out Harold E. Neigh, extension consumer economics specialist, The Pennsylvania State University. Food standards require margarine to have 80 per cent fat. Since low-calorie margarines have only about half that amount, they are required by law to be labeled "imitation."
