**Apple, Pear Crop Stable**

The state's apple and pear production was reported as even with last year and six per cent above a year earlier respectively according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

The apple crop, based on 12,250 million pounds, is 11 per cent from 12,200 million pounds in 1969, some 15 per cent above production but only a third of that in 1963.

Adequate soil moisture during most of the season produced good sized apples. Conditions in the south central district declined late in the season, however, because of dry hot weather.

**Manbeck Says It's Time to Quit Spending on Unnecessary Programs**

Senator Clarence F. Manbeck, Republican State Senator from the 48th District, will be on the ballot November 3 seeking re-election.

As a senior senator, Manbeck is chairman of the Labor and Industry Committee, vice chairman of the Agriculture Committee, and serves on these additional committees: Appropriations, Education, Elections and Re-apportionment, Forests and Waters, Game and Fish, Judiciary, Military Affairs and Aeronautics, and State Government.

On the subject of taxes, Sena-

tor Manbeck said in a recent public address. "With the taxpayers of Pennsylvania under such great strain to meet the existing taxes, the time has come to quit entertaining new ways to spend money. Budget reductions must come from social programs that are being supported with tax money programs that may be nice to have, but not necessary."

Recently, Manbeck introduced legislation that calls for the elimination of the free college scholarship program to be replaced with a state supported college loan program. It is estimated that the savings of this plan alone will be approximately \$80 million a year.

He further stated that 83 per cent of Pennsylvania's income from all tax sources being consumed by Health & Welfare and Education, that the time has come to examine the public assistance roles to make sure the needy are getting welfare, not the greedy.

He is married to the former Eve Pyse, and has two daughters, Alletta and Barbara. A resident of Fredericksburg RD1, Senator Manbeck attends the St. Johns Lutheran Church, Fredericksburg.

Senator Manbeck has represented the 48th District since 1966.

He was born September 21, 1908, in Bethel Township, Berks County. Later he founded a chicken processing firm in Fredericksburg, which today employs more than 150 people.

Although the Senate roll call sheet still shows Senator Manbeck's occupation as a farmer, an occupation of which he is still very proud, Manbeck is also President of Farmers Pride, Inc., a company that operates retail stores in Pennsylvania and Ohio, employing about 110 people. A director of the First National Bank of Fredericksburg and the Lebanon Mutual Insurance Company, the Senator also finds time to serve on the Board of Managers of the Good Samaritan Hospital in Lebanon.

A former school director and chairman of the school build-

ing committee, Manbeck was a District Governor of Lions International, a Director of the Chamber of Commerce of Lebanon City and County, a Director of the Community Chest and the Lebanon County Tuberculosis and Child Health.

● Teaching will finally change from information-giving to directing learning.

● School facilities will become more open, more flexible and less group oriented.

● Curriculum will become more relevant.

● Outmoded myths and incomplete educational tradition can be exposed and perhaps eliminated from the schools.

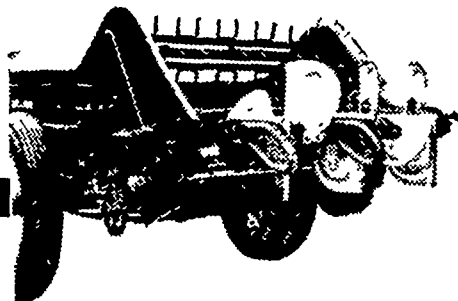
Lessinger concluded that accountability may have substantive effects on two of the most pressing educational problems today — student unrest and boredom.

"Accountability is not a panacea — it is a change in attitude and perspective. It runs counter to Larry Peter's principle. It jerks us up by the scruff of the neck."

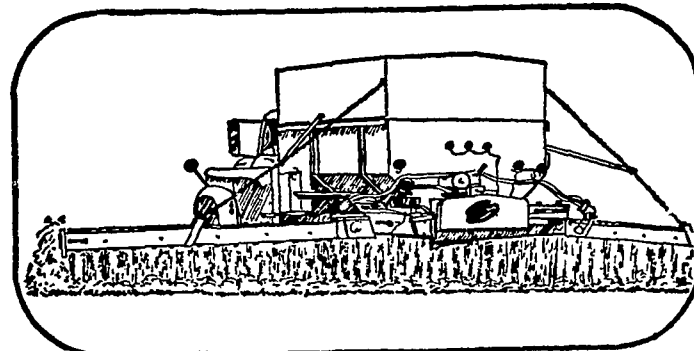
