

Lancaster County Pomona Grange Elects Two Committee Members

The fall meeting of Lancaster County Pomona Grange 71 was held at Oakryn a guests of Fulton Grange 68

Gyles H. Brown, Pomona Master, conducted the business session when Alfred Wanner Sr., Salisbury Grange, was elected a member of the executive committee and David Brinton, Colerain Grange, elected a member of the finance committee for three year terms. They will be installed at the January meeting.

The Pomona Grange reiterated its stand of last April that our laws should be changed to give law enforcement officers the necessary powers to make arrests of criminals, stating that they are hampered in performing their duties by a lot of court decisions giving the criminal much more protection than the arresting officers.

They also stated that crime has reached a point that a law-abiding citizen is not safe outside of his home, and if he leaves home for any length of time his house is in danger of vandalism.

They adopted a resolution asking that plans for new highways being built to replace existing highways be submitted to township supervisors, through which the highway passes, for suggested changes before final plans are adopted. The resolution stated that many highways are designed by engineers who are ignorant of the needs of the community and the community is not aware of the discrepancies until after the contract is let and thousands of dollars spent. They stated that this often results with exists at the wrong place or the highway ending a mile or two short of where it should, startling examples of which are the new route 272 being built, and a few years ago the bridge to nowhere crossing over route 230 in Lancaster County.

Serving on the resolution committee were C. G. McSparran, Loran Brinton and S. Ralph Wanner.

Mrs. Jesse Wood, Lecturer, presented the program which centered around apples in observance of National Apple Week. Many tempting apple dishes prepared by Grange ladies

were auctioned off to high bidders by Jesse Wood. A roll call featured apple quotations, naming apple varieties or telling something about apples. She conducted a guessing game entitled "Do You Know Your Apples."

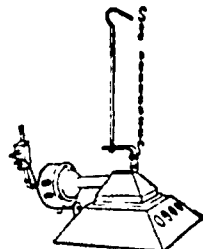
