WASHINGTON REPORT

Presidential commissions recently have been very much in the news. Controversy has resulted from the reports issued by two of these high level groups—one appointed a few months ago by President Nixon and the other appointed two years ago by President Johnson.

President Nixon's group, the Commission on Campus Unrest, drew some conclusions about student disorder and the Government's role in campus turmoil which led to a national debate on the validity of the findings. President Johnson's group, the Commission on Obscenity and Pornography, came to some conclusions about smut which enraged citizens throughout the country.

It was interesting to note that one commission called on Americans, through their government, to exert the highest form of moral leadership, while the other commission recommended that we reduce morality to its lowest common denominator. While, like the Vice President, I find some aspects of the campus unrest report disturbingly slanted toward a permissive philosophy,

I do believe its chief message is noble and commendable. It calls on all groups involved in college disorders to refrain from violence and incitement to violence. The obscenity report has no such high-minded purpose. It merely calls on Americans to condone filth in all its many forms.

Too often these days we are asked as a society to go in the direction the pornography commission recommends — on a downhill road toward the vulgarity in man's nature. Governments, schools, and even churches are on record as asking people to defend the indefensible or accept the unacceptable. Hopefully, in the case of the obscenity report, the trend will be reversed.

I can see no logical reason for doing away with our controls on pornography. Some movies, books and magazines already have stepped far beyond the bounds of common decency.

Decency implies a recognition that man is more than a beast. Much of what we see in the theater or read in our literature today carries no message about the spirituality of men. Why should we move even further in this direction? The pornography commission based most of its findings on the so-called fact that smut is harmless. The commission said its research showed that no harm resulted from adults being exposed to dirty books or dirty movies. I doubt that conclusion. But, even so, should physical or emotional harm be the only tests? As a society we have always prided ourselves that we have as our foremost concern the goal of individual excellence. To have that pride smothered in filth would seem to be harm of a sort that the commission did not bother to measure.

During the time I have served in Congress there has been little enthusiasm for dropping the penalties for peddling smut. Rather, we have tended to move toward stiffer controls like the laws which clamp down on the practice of selling smut through the mail. This is the direction in which Congress should continue to move. The best that the obscenity report deserves is to be ignored.

Meat Imports Increase

Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin has announced that the fourth quarterly estimate of imports of meat subject to the Meat Import Law into the United States during 1970 places the total at 1,160 million pounds, 20 million pounds higher than the level of 1,140 million pounds estimated on June 30, 1970.

The increase of 20 million pounds is based largely on a revision in the estimated imports from Canada which is not a participant in the voluntary restraint program.
