

Na-Churs Promotes Two Lancaster County Men

Stan Keller, Na Churs regional manager for Eastern Pennsylvania and New Jersey, has announced the promotions of M. David Brubaker, Mount Joy, to area manager and Roy L. Shertzer, Lancaster RD6 to district manager.

Brubaker joined the company in January 1965 as a field representative. He was largely responsible for getting farmers in the Lancaster and Southern Lebanon County areas acquainted with the special soil testing service and crop pro-

grams offered by the company. The Brubakers live in their new home built on a lot which was part of their farm southwest of Mount Joy where they grew corn and led steers.

FARM WOMEN Society 14

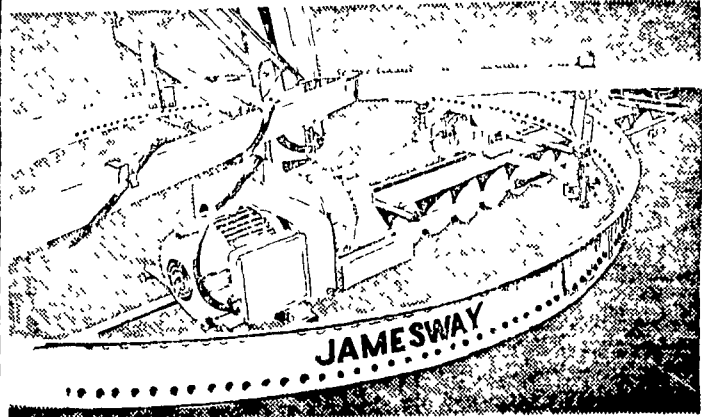
