(Continued from Page 18) Wrap left over meats tightly so the surface doesn't dry out. Some sausage products are available in resealable packages. Take out what you want and press the package shut. The meat stays moist and fresh. The following recipe for ham balls makes use of two pork



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products — ground ham and ground pork.

- GLAZED HAM BALLS**
- 2 cups herb seasoned stuffing
 - 2 cups croutons
 - 1 cup milk
 - 2 tablespoons finely chopped onions
 - 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
 - 2 1/4 pound ground ham
 - 2 1/4 pound ground pork
 - 1/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
 - 1/4 cup dark corn syrup
 - 2 tablespoons vinegar
 - 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

Soak croutons in milk about five minutes or until soft. Beat until smooth and fluffy. Add onions and Worcestershire sauce, mixing to combine. Stir in ham and pork; mix thoroughly. Shape mixture into 12 balls about two inches in diameter. Place in muffin-pan cups or in a shallow baking pan. Combine brown sugar, corn syrup, vinegar and mustard in small saucepan until smooth. Bring to boiling point, stirring constantly. Cook one minute. Pour over meat balls. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 40 minutes or until browned. Six servings, two balls each

PORK CHOP-VEGETABLE COMBO

- 6 pork rib chops, cut 1/2 to 3/4 inch thick
 - 2 tablespoons lard or drippings
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1 package (9 ounces) frozen Frenched green beans
 - 1 1/2 cups coarsely grated carrots
 - 1/2 cup thinly sliced celery
 - 3/4 cup water
 - 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed mushroom soup
 - 1/2 cup crushed bite-size shredded wheat
 - 2 teaspoons butter or margarine
 - 1/8 teaspoon thyme
- Brown chops in drippings. Season. Combine green beans, carrots, celery and water in saucepan. Bring to a boil. Add mushroom soup. Place vegetable mixture in a 12 x 9-inch baking dish. Arrange chops on top. Cover and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 30 minutes. Combine crushed shredded wheat, butter, or margarine and thyme. Remove cover, sprinkle with crushed mixture and continue baking 15 to 20 minutes or until done. Makes six servings

The next meeting will be No-

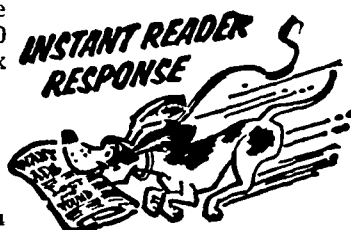

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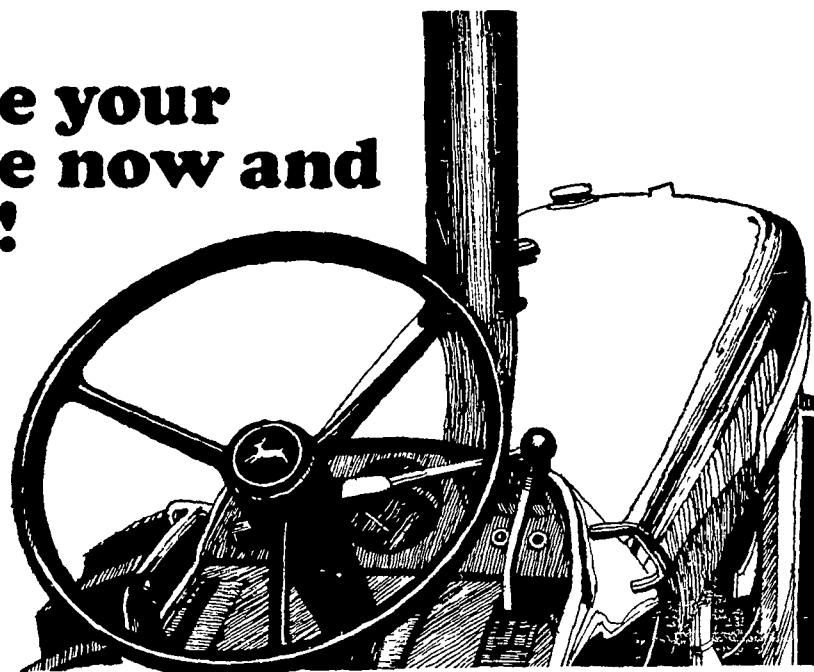
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
