Japan Developing New Dairy Products

Japan is making great strides in the creation and development of new dairy products according to Dr. Richard E. Farrar, executive vice president of Dairy Research, Inc.

Farrar made a tour of dairy plants in Japan and other countries after attending the International Dairy Congress in Sydney, Australia, October 12-13.

While visiting the Tama Plant of Morinaga, near Tokyo, Farrar found such products as a whey based orange drink,

skim milk with lactic acid and a caramel flavor, a milk based carbonated drink with banana flavoring. These products, plus others are all on the Japanese market and attaining good sales volume and customer acceptance.

One of the highlights of the Morinaga visit was a guided tour by the Plant Manager of the Demineralizing Plant.

Dr. Farrar, who visited dairy plants and food outlets in Hawaii, Australia, Tokyo and Hong Kong, said that some of the dairy food ideas he found overseas might soon be adapted for U.S. consumption.

during Dr. Farrar's presence Dairy Research, Inc. located in Ashington Heights, Illinois, is a non-profit research and market development organization, which aims to stimulate the development of new and increased uses for milk and dairy products in the U.S. It is financed 100 per cent by dairy farmers.
