The U.S. Supreme Court has been asked to decide the state's right to exercise the law of eminent domain for a water fowl preserve.

Attorneys for Mr and Mis Lester G. Risser, Newmanstown RD1, are specifically challenging the state's taking of the Risser's 105 acre farm in Lebanon County for the Middle Creek Water Fowl Project in Lancastei and Lebanon Counties The Supreme Court was asked to intervene in September, but still has not reached a decision on whether to take jurisdiction.

The Lebanon County Court ruled against the Rissers in July, 1969, and the Pennsylvania Supreme Court upheld the lower court in April of this year
