Prices ¼-½ cents higher on light type hens Farm offerings while occasionally limited are fully adequate for buver needs as buyeis often deer hunting in Pennsylvania In New Jersey, processors often in partial operation for lack of supplies Demand for finished product generally good Offerings of heavy type hens fully adequate for fair call Prices paid at farm: Light type hens 4-5½ mostly 5¼-5½ in Pennsylvania mostly 4½ in New Jersey. Heavy type hens TFEWR.

Wednesday, December 2
Ready-to-Cook movement light and very unaggressive with cancellations of previous commitments widespread Trade advices indicate offerings of plant grade as low as 25 cents failing to clear this morning Advance interest light with a wait and see position prevailing while awaiting further market developments Live supplies ample with weights generally heavier than desired at most plants Undertone weak and unsettled Pool trucklot prices for Thursday arrival in the New York Area

Chicago Cattle Weekly Review

Monday-Wednesday November 30-December 2
CATTLE — Compared last weeks close, slaughter steers 50-75 lower, most decline on weights over 1100 lbs, this the sixth consecutive week of lower prices. Slaughter heifers mostly 100 lower. Cows 25-50 lower. Bulls unchanged

Receipts 77 percent slaughter steers, 20 percent heifers, balance mainly cows Overall finish of slaughter steers not as attractive as last week with 13 percent prime and 77 percent choice, compared with 16 percent prime and 79 percent choice last week, and 18 percent prime and 74 percent choice last year Average cost and weight of slaughter steers, estimated at 27.50, lowest for any week since July, 1968, and 1165 lbs, compared with 28.18 and 1160 lbs last week, and 29.07 and 1180 lbs last year. Heifer supply mainly high good to low prime weighing 850-1100 lbs.

SLAUGHTER STEERS On Monday, four loads prime 1225-1350 lbs and couple loads high choice and prime 1100 lbs brought 28.50, the lowest weekly top since June 1968 On Wednesday, prime 1225-1350 lbs yield grade 3 and 4 27.75-28.00, fully 15 loads at latter price, including four loads high choice and prime 1075-1125 lbs high choice and prime 1075-1375 lbs 27.25-27.75, choice 950-1350 lbs yield grade 2 to 4 26.75-27.50, mixed good and choice 26.50-27.00, good 25.75-26.50, standard and low good 24.00-25.75

SLAUGHTER HEIFERS On Monday, high choice and prime 950-1100 lbs yield grade 3 and 4 brought 27.25-27.50, the latter the lowest weekly top since November, 1968 On Wednesday, comparable grades and weights 26.25-26.75, choice 850-1025 lbs yield grade 2 to 4 25.50-26.25, mixed good and choice 25.00-25.50, good 23.50-25.25.

Wednesday, December 2
Prices continued to reflect a weak and nervous undertone with liberal offerings of extra large occasionally selling as low as 38-42½ mostly 39-41½c in effort to reduce inventories Trading locally on all sizes was dull with best interest reflected in out of town shipments Receipts light to moderate but still mostly of nearby origin Incoming loads of browns were

slow in clearing with large browns bringing 43-45c Street sales of jumbo whites noted at 44½-45½c and peewee whites at 24-25c Increasing interest to ship nest runs into this market reported Carton orders for the balance of the week was slow to far.
