## Co. Farmers Assn. Board Meets

The Lancaster County Farmers Association board Tuesday night announced that plans have been tentatively set to hold the summer picnic on July 23.

A spring membership meeting was set for March 19. A county commissioner will speak on land assessment and taxes in Lancaster County.

President James Kreider announced that 27 of the \$100 debentures were sold in Lancaster County. The money is being used to pay for a new statewide Farmers Association office building.

The congressional tour to Washington has been set for

March 2 and 3. The county will send a delegation to visit Congressman Ed Eshleman.

Also, a state legislative tour has been set for March 29 in Harrisburg. Each legislative committee will visit with his particular senator or assemblyman and a banquet will follow.

The board voted to purchase 10,000 "Food Is a Bargain" pamphlets for distribution in Lancaster County stores.

## Ewe Flocks

The ewe flock needs some attention during the winter months of a good lamb crop is to be realized. Liberal amounts of quality legume hay should be the foundation of the ration. Daily outside exercise with plenty of fresh water is another requirement. The grain fed should be limited depending upon the condition of the ewes. Too much grain will get them too fat and they will have weaker lambs. In some cases the ewes may have to be forced to take exercise by feeding hay on frozen ground or on the snow at distant parts of their outside exercise lot. Total confinement is discouraged for the breeding flock during the winter months. Loose salt should be available at all times from a box or feeder under roof.
