County Conservation District Supports Frysville Farmers

The Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation District has voted to support a Muddy Run citizens group which is contending that a proposed new poultry plant would pollute the creek.

The Conservation District adopted a resolution to support a group of Frysville farmers headed by Miles Fry and the farmers' contention that:

—A new poultry processing plant by G&M Poultry Corp. should have a three-stage tertiary sewage system. A three stage system would make effluent 98 per cent pure, Fry said.

—A qualified sewage operator should be hired to run the treatment plant.

—The firm should be required to dump sludge on areas only where there is no possible

chance of it being washed back into the creek.

The new poultry processing plant would give off 50,000 gallons of effluent a day from a dressing operation of 16,000 birds per day, Fry said. Fry's group has contended that under present sewage treatment plans, the new plant would considerably increase pollution on the creek.

In other action, the annual Conservation banquet was set for March 23 at Blue Ball Fire Hall. John Rehakamp, Philadelphia landscape engineer, was announced as speaker.

A new district forester was announced to replace Ken Schwartz. He is Patrick Lantz.

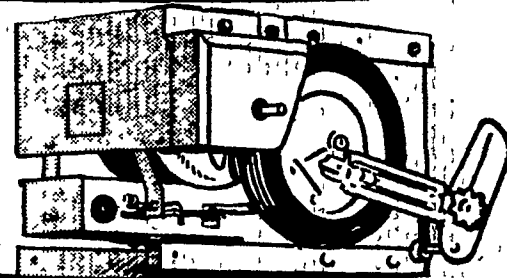
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
