

Local Winners in Corn Competition

Southeastern Pennsylvania corn growers won about half of the top awards in competition this week at the Pennsylvania Farm Show.

Lancaster County corn growers won first place in three classes and York County had two firsts. The winners included the following:

Local Corn Entries Win in 1 Acre Competition

Outstanding profits per acre enabled five Pennsylvania high school students to tie for top honors in two divisions of the 1970 One Acre Corn Contest, it was announced tonight at the Farm Show corn growers banquet.

Co-champion in growing long season hybrids was Ray Brubaker, Quarryville, RD2, with a profit of \$174 per acre and an average yield of 219 bushels per acre.

Lloyd Zeiset was one of three growers tied for the championship among hybrids used in medium length growing seasons. Zeiset had a profit of \$150 per acre and 203 bushels per acre.

Open to all farm youth under 21 years of age, the contest is sponsored annually by the Pennsylvania Crop Improvement Association. Financial assistance is provided by seed corn producers. Fields are hand harvested.

Among other youth with high scores in growing long season hybrids were Joseph Lefever, Manheim RD4, \$142 profit, 184 bushels per acre, Dennis Rohrer, Lititz RD2, \$140 profit, 179 bushels per acre, and Clark Stauffer, Ephrata RD1, \$135 profit, 180 bushels per acre.
