Cynthia's brother, George M. Knight III, showed the reserve champion, Woodbine Ivanhoe Fancy, an eight-year-old.

Franklin Co. Tops Apples

The Franklin County Horticultural Association captured first place in the county apple exhibit at the 55th Farm Show. This marks the eighth consecutive year that the Franklin County growers have taken top honors in apple judging competition.

The Franklin County Horticultural Association was also named recipient of the Gabriel Heister Award for the best collective display of apples.

Kutztown Wins in Poultry

Donald W. Nace, Spring Grove RD3, York County, had the best red clover sample.

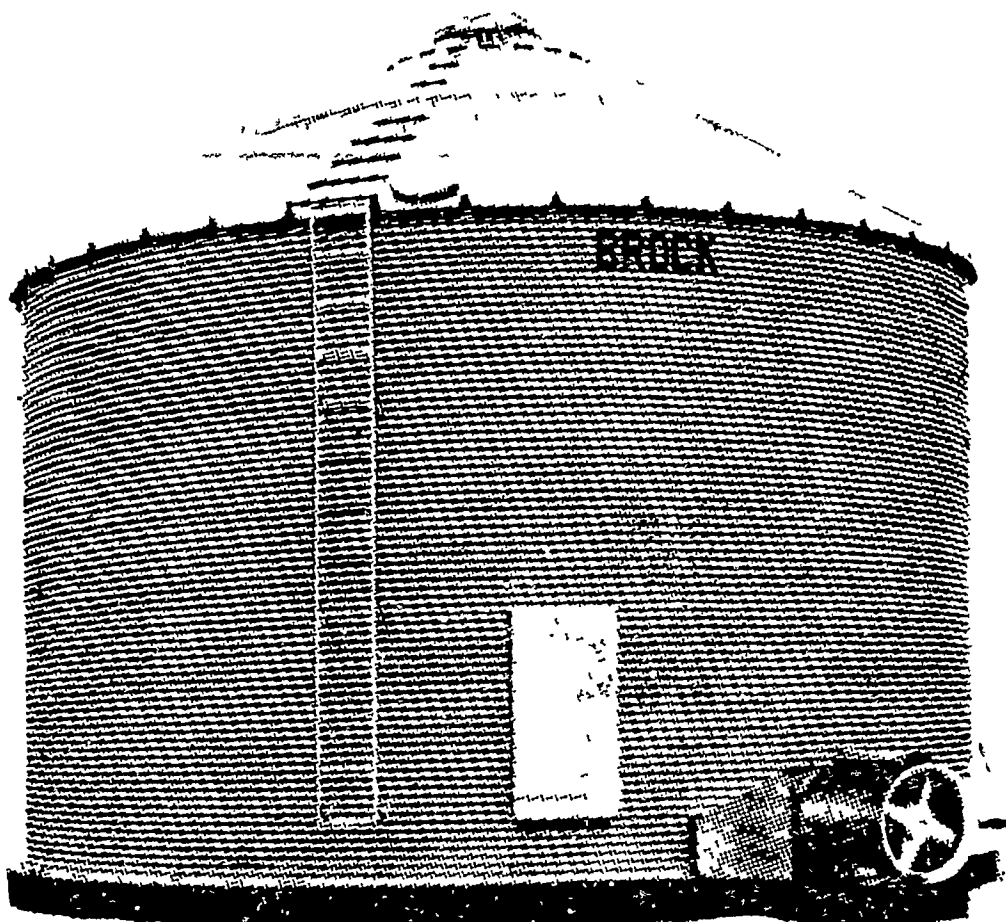
Home Economics Exhibit

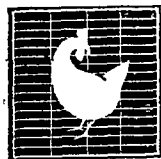
