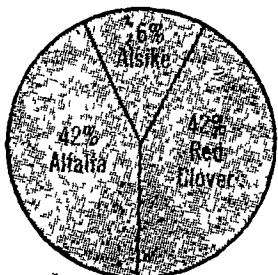

Weekly Review

Monday-Wednesday, January 11 - January 13

CATTLE — Compared last weeks close, slaughter steers 25-50 higher, slaughter heifers 50-75 higher, cows 100-200 lower, bulls steady.

Additional price upturns in the wholesale dressed beef trade proved to be the major bullish factor contributing to the advance in slaughter steers and heifer prices. On Monday both slaughter steers and heifers encountered a slightly weaker price trend due to increased receipts and a slightly curtailed Eastern demand However, and price weakness on Monday was more than offset Wednesday when live prices advanced in face of a much broader demand Buyers representing Canadian packers were much more aggressive than the past few weeks and purchased nearly 1,400 head of High Good to Average Choice steers for shipment to Canada for slaughter.

Receipts 73 percent slaughter steers, 21 percent heifers, balance mainly cows Overall finish of slaughter steers slightly more attractive than last week with an estimated 20 percent Prime and 70 percent Choice. This compares with 18 percent Prime and 75 percent Choice last week, and 22 percent Prime and 68 percent Choice last year. Heifer supply mainly High Good to Low Prime weighing 850-1125 lbs

SLAUGHTER STEERS — On Wednesday, Prime 1150-1350 lbs Yield Grade 3 and 4 29.00-29.50, with six loads 1200-1350 lbs at 29.75 Load Prime 1235 lbs Yield Grade 4 and 5 28.75. High Choice and Prime 1025-1150 lbs 29.00-29.50, comparable Grade 1150-1400 lbs 28.50-29.25, Choice 950-1375 lbs Grade 2 to 4 28.00-29.00, Mixed Good and Choice 27.50-28.00, Good 26.00-27.50, Standard and Low Good 24.50-26.00
