Emergency Loan Service Improved by Relief Act

Farmers hit by natural disaster may receive better emergency loan service from the US Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration as a result of the Disaster Relief Act of 1970, according to James V Smith, FHA Administrator

Under the new law, when the President declares a major disaster or the Secretary of Africulture designates a natural disaster area

- 1 Unavailability of agricultural credit is removed as a requirement for such a designation
- 2 Loans to eligible farmer applicants can be approved within the flist year of operation following a disaster whether or not other credit resources are available. Previously the prospective borrower was required to show that he could not obtain other credit
- 3 Interest and principle payments may be deferred during the first three years of the loan where planned income, because of the disaster, will be less than planned recurring expenses
- 4 Interest rates will be based or cost of certain Federal government borrowings, but not to exe-ed six per cent

Wherever the President has declared a major disaster.

- invoked that will cancel a portion of the principal of loans made to replace loss or repair damage
- 2. Retinancing of existing liens against destroyed structures and equipment is permitted when the applicant has reasonable repayment prospects and the loan is needed to retain the property
