an experiment underway at Penn State to pump sewage onto crops and forests. Besides the plant food value of the sewage, he noted the top six inches of soil is "a great natural filter" to purify water.

Judy Longenecker who spent six months in Great Britain last year showed slides and spoke of her experiences. She spent time in several countries including England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales, and the Channel Islands

A report on 1970 Extension activities also was presented at the meeting.

In 4-H Club work, 69 clubs came under extension direction, with 2,662 projects conducted by the youths. A total of 5,320 youngsters took part in the 4-H TV Club held last year.

Clubs were assisted by 338 leaders.



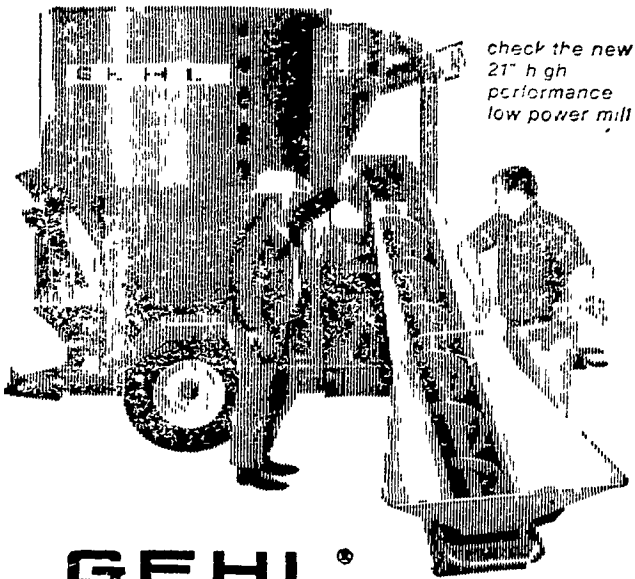
