



## County Grange Adopts Resolutions

Lancaster County Pomona Grange 71 held its regular meeting April 17 at White Horse Fire Hall as guests of Salisbury Grange.

April being Youth Month in the Grange, the young people filled officers chairs for opening and closing the Grange and took part in the program.

Pomona Grange Master, Gyles H. Brown, conducted the business meeting when the following resolutions were adopted:

(1) WHEREAS, Governor Shapp has stated that he will introduce legislation requiring the larger counties of this commonwealth to establish county boards of health. And

WHEREAS, Cost of such program is to approximate 50 million dollars or more. And

WHEREAS, The people of Pennsylvania are already taxed

entirely too much and experience has shown that such regulatory boards accomplish little or nothing that cannot be done under our present system of health control. Be it

RESOLVED, That Lancaster County Pomona Grange No. 71, meeting in regular session, opposes this legislation.

(2) WHEREAS, Too many of our rural roads have been oil-d and covered with stone 3/4 inch or larger, creating a condition hazardous to drive on and very hard on tires. And

WHEREAS, The state engineers have stated that the only reason that the larger stone is used is to give the suppliers of stone an opportunity to get rid of a size stone that has little market value. And

WHEREAS, Same stone can be crushed to a smaller, more efficient size. Be it

RESOLVED, That Lancaster County Pomona Grange asks that the practice of using 3/4 inch or larger stone for oiling be discontinued.

(3) WHEREAS, The Rural Community Development Revenue Sharing Act of 1971 would replace the Smith-Lever Act under which the County Extension Service is financed. And

WHEREAS, Without the direction of the Smith-Lever Act the federal funds for Extension could be distributed in any manner determined by the state to one or a dozen or more institutions or agencies, thus placing this vital service in the position of a political football and completely destroying its effectiveness. And

WHEREAS, Without our Extension Service the 4-H programs would be eliminated, and there are over 100,000 members in Pennsylvania alone, and it would endanger the capacity of the United States to produce enough food to feed our ever increasing population. Be it

RESOLVED, That Lancaster County Pomona Grange No. 71, meeting in regular session, asks

that the present method of financing the Extension Service under the Smith-Lever Act be continued.

In other action, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Wood were selected to represent the Pomona Grange at the election of trustees for Penn State University June 17, 1971.

Alfred Wanner, Jr., Pomona Youth chairman, will attend State Grange Leadership School June 22, 23, 24 at Gettysburg College.

Lancaster County Pomona Grange officers will fill officers chairs for the Pomona District meeting at Kimberton Grange Hall in Chester County June 19.

Salisbury Grange will host the county Grange visitation meeting June 1 with Colerain Grange officers filling officers' chairs for opening and closing the meeting and Fulton Grange presenting the program on "Honey." The theme of these visitation meetings is Promote Pennsylvania Products.

## Livestock Exposition Gets Its Name Changed

The Pennsylvania Livestock Exposition, which has been an annual event for many years, has received a name change.

The new name is Keystone International Livestock Exposition.

The Keystone will be held November 6-13, with an All-Eastern Junior Beef Breeding Show Saturday through Sunday and an educational event, Horse-O-Rama, on Saturday.

The name change was recommended by the Exposition Executive Council and approved at the March meeting of the Pennsylvania Livestock and Allied Industries Association.
