## Chicago Cattle Weekly Review

Monday - Wednesday April 19 - April 21

Compared last Friday, slaughter steers uneven, High Choice and Prime steady to 25c higher, Average Choice and Below steady to 50c lower, slaughter heifers 50c-75c lower, cows strong to 25c higher, bulls steady.

A varied demand again resulted in a two-way price trend Demand improved for High Choice and Prime slaughter steers, resulting in a slight price gain Meanwhile, kinds Average Choice and Below, as well as slaughter heifers, were under pressure and declined in face of lower wholesale dressed beef prices early in the week.

Receipts 72 percent slaughter steers, 23 percent heifers, balance mainly cows Overall finish of slaughter steers slightly more attractive than last week with 12 percent Prime and 70 percent Choice, compared with 10 percent Prime and 70 percent Choice last week, and 12 percent Prime and 76 percent Choice last year Heifer supply mainly High Good to Low Prime weighing 850-1075 lbs
