

Manheim Central FFA Wins Gas Engine Event

The Manheim Central FFA Chapter small gas engine team won the area FFA contest at New Holland last Friday.

The team members are Amos Sauder, Manheim RD1, and Tony Haldeman, 1172 Mount Joy Road, Manheim.

Manheim Central beat three other teams. Garden Spot High School, New Holland, was second; Solanco High School, Quarryville was third, and Oxford High School, Chester County, was fourth.

Both Manheim Central and Garden Spot are eligible to go to Penn State to compete in the state contest during FFA Week June 30-July 2.

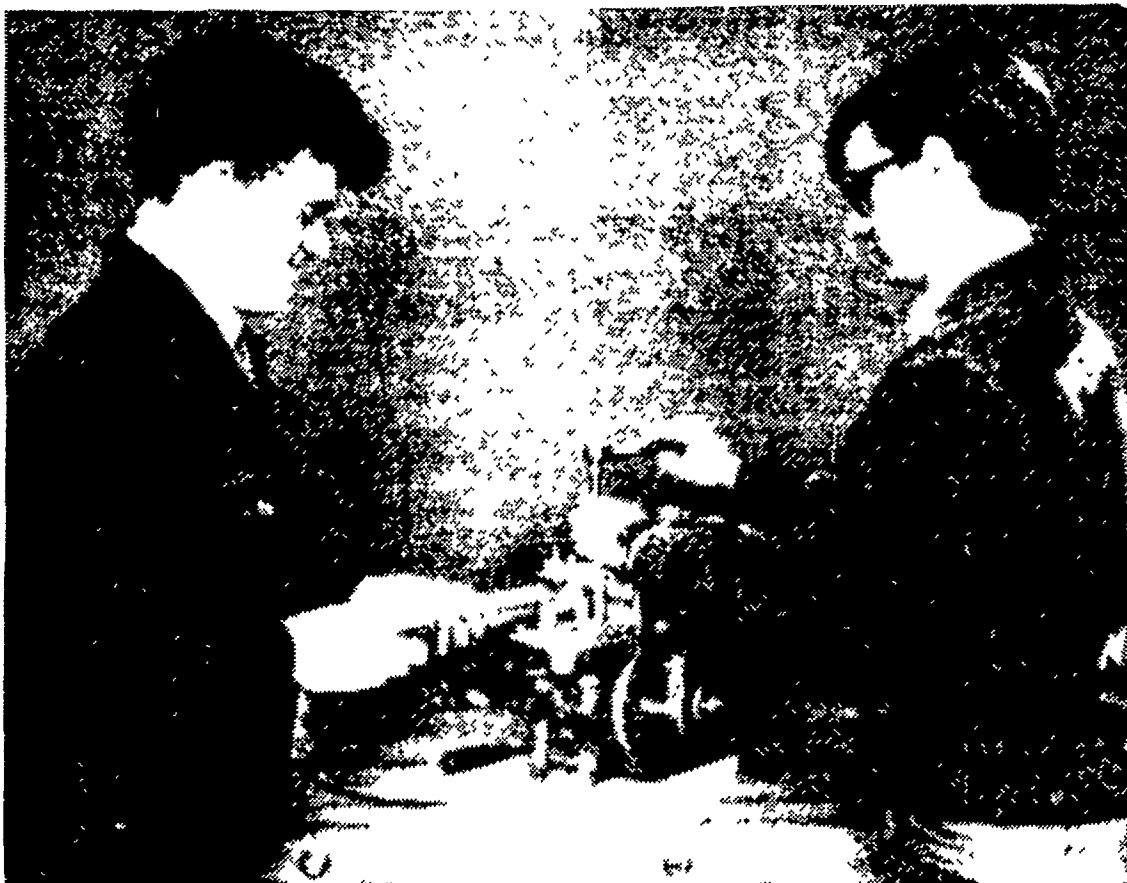
The contest consisted of a written test on small gas engine operation and repair; use

of the small gas engine service manual, and trouble shooting an engine to find and repair faults which had been built into it.

Members of the second place team from Garden Spot were Rich Kochel and Ken Burkhart.

In individual scoring, Sauder of Manheim Central was first and Kochel of Garden Spot was second. Other placings were: Haldeman, Manheim Central, third; Burkhart, Garden Spot, fourth; Robert Young, Solanco, fifth.

Judges were: Arba Henry, Solanco vo-ag teacher; Scott Gold, Oxford vo-ag teacher; Mark Campbell, Manheim Central vo-ag teacher; Clifford Day and Donald Robinson, Garden Spot High School vo-ag teachers.

Help Asked For Risser

Governor Milton Shapp Wednesday urged the State Game Commission to agree to his suggestion that Lester G. Risser be permitted to keep most of his 104-acre farm, inside the perimeter of the Middle Creek Waterfowl Refuge.

Risser, a Newmantown RD1 farmer, has fought the Game Commission for five years, going all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court, only to be denied a hearing.

Gov. Shapp indicated in March that he was seeking to grant relief to Risser, the Supreme Court refusal notwithstanding.

"What's the difference if Risser remains, or if his land is rented out to sharecroppers, as you've indicated will happen?" Shapp has asked Glenn L. Bowers, Game Commission executive director. Satisfactory controls can be worked out in an

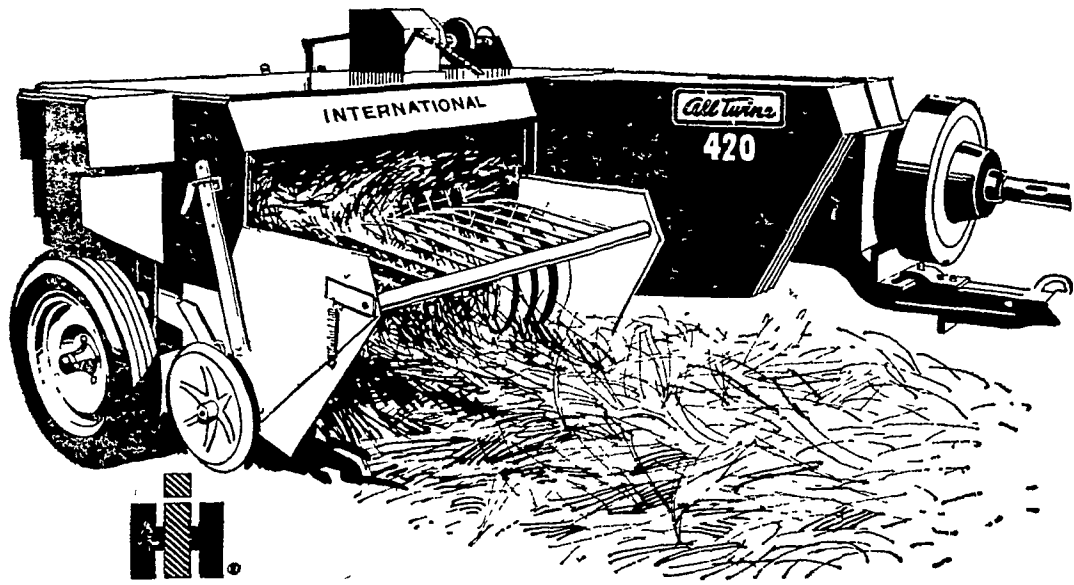
agreement, according to Shapp. Bowers contends that Risser has cost the \$3 million project "hundreds of thousands of dollars" and caused months of delay.

Shapp has argued that Risser hasn't been "a wild man" but a man fighting to protect his property.
