Compared last Friday, slaughter steers steady, slaughter heifers strong to mostly 25 higher, cows and bulls steady to strong

Only minor price changes were registered in the slaughter steer trade. On Monday, High Choice and Prime kinds registered a slight price upturn in face of reduced numbers. However, this advance was offset by a slight decline Wednesday when High Choice and Prime steers made up a larger percentage of the supply. Meanwhile, Average Choice and Below met with a fairly dependable demand at steady prices.

Receipts 75 per cent slaughter steers, 22 per cent heifers, balance mainly cows. Overall finish of slaughter steers about the same as last week with 17 percent Prime and 70 percent Choice, compared with 18 percent Prime and 75 percent Choice last year. Heifer supply mainly Average Good to Low Prime weighing 850-1025 lbs.

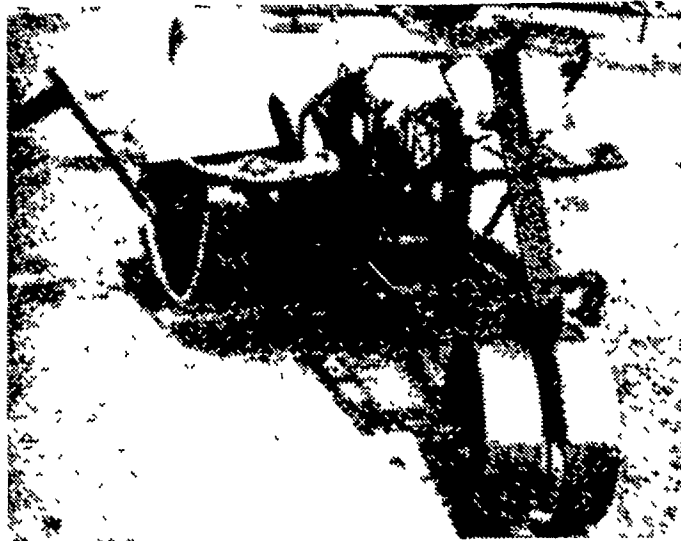
