

Pa. Begins Limited Gypsy Moth Program

About 20,000 acres of prime recreational forest land in four northeastern Pennsylvania counties will be sprayed in the Gypsy Moth Control Program says Henry F. Nixon, Director of the Bureau of Plant Industry, Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture.

Revealing that local governments will participate for the first time, Nixon said the cost of the 1971 program would be shared equally by local governments, the United States Forest Service and the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture.

Although large areas of the counties in the northeastern part of the state are known to be infested, the land selected for treatment was limited to areas with the heaviest infestation and economic threat to the tourist business, Nixon added.

The spraying program was slated to get under way about May 15, Nixon said it would be done by helicopter so that the insecticide could be applied to the target areas avoiding lakes and ponds.

Considered the safest chemical available for the control of gypsy moth, the insecticide SEVIN-4-oil will be used in the program. Nixon said the chemical poses no hazard to humans and that past experience indicates extremely low toxicity to wildlife and domestic animals.

As part of the control program the Department will conduct monitoring activities to (1) determine duration of effective-

ness of insecticide, (2) determine the rate of kill of the gypsy moth larvae, and (3) study the effects of the chemical or other biological values.

Calling attention to the Department's biological efforts to control the destructive moth, Nixon said two areas in which there are heavy concentrations of previously planted biological agents would not be treated in hopes they would multiply and spread to adjacent areas.

Declaring that all areas selected for this year's treatment program have populations of gypsy moth sufficient to cause at least 50 percent defoliation unless sprayed, Nixon said present treatment programs are designed only to provide temporary protection to forests and shade trees.

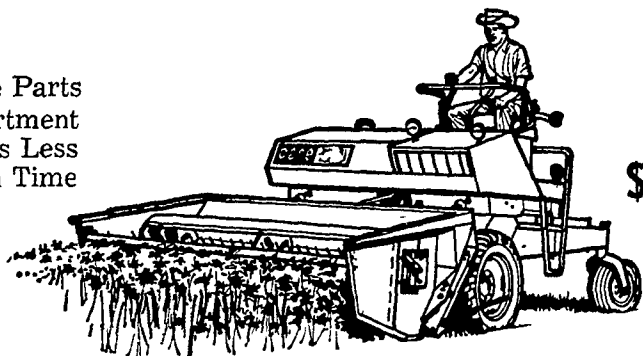

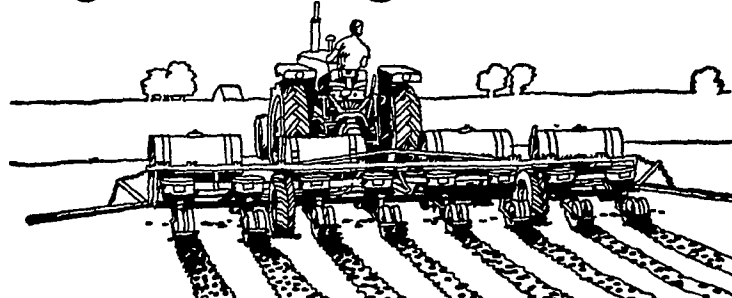
