## Public Hearings Set on Proposed Potato Research, Promotion Plan

A public hearing on a proposed research and promotion plan for potatoes has been scheduled by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The hearing will begin at 9:30 a.m., local time, at each of the following locations:

June 22, Denver, Colo., House Chamber, State Capitol Bldg., Colfax, & Lincoln Sts.

June 29, San Francisco, Calif., Rm. 13450 Federal Bldg., 450 Golden Gate Ave.; and

July 7, Washington, D.C., Freer Art Gallery Auditorium, 12th and Jefferson Drive, S.W.

Establishment of this plan was authorized by Congress in the Potato Research and Promotion Act, which was approved January 11, 1971.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service said the proposed plan and the request for a hearing on it were submitted by the National Potato Council, composed of potato producers.

The plan provides for a nationally coordinated research and promotion program which would be financed by an assessment of up to one cent per hundredweight of potatoes handled. Producers not wishing to

contribute would be reimbursed upon written application.

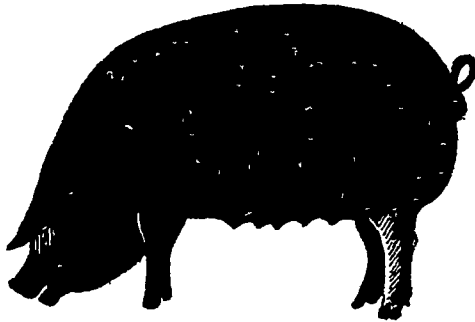
The program would be administered by a board composed of producers selected by the Secretary of Agriculture from nominations made by potato producers.

All potato producers growing five or more acres of potatoes in the 48 contiguous States would be included under the plan. Contracts for research and promotion would be made by the board after approval of the Secretary of Agriculture.

All interested persons are invited to testify at the public hearing. If sufficient evidence is developed at the hearing to support the proposal — or appropriate revisions of it — and the Secretary of Agriculture approves it, the plan will be submitted to producers in a referendum.

The notice was scheduled for publication in the Federal Register May 8. Single copies may be obtained from the Fruit and Vegetable Division, C&MS, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

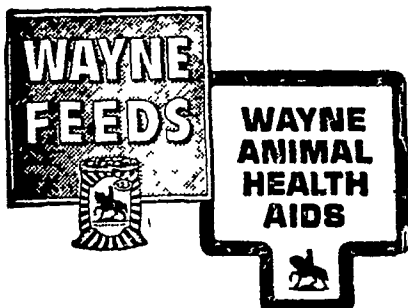
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
