Prices are generally unchanged Undertone continues weak and unsettled Despite current low price levels, dealers were being forced to extend price protection and/or other incentives in effort to maintain movement Demand generally quiet with a wait and see attitude prevailing this morning Trading stocks of jumbos light, extra large irregularly distributed with street sales noted at 30 31 1/2 cents Large and mediums burdensome Smalls accumulating in all quarters and offerings at 16-18 cents are failing to attract interest Peewees, offered at 12 cents, not moving Canton orders slow to fair despite increasing retail promotional activity In instances, large being featured at 39 cents a dozen Restaurant and institutional sales also slow.

## Mobile School Lunches

Newly-designed, self-contained portable units for feeding meals within school classrooms have eliminated need for canteens.

The units are the product of the National School Lunch Company in Virginia

Each unit contains meals for 14 1/2 children, two employees can handle 10 units and the average meal complying with Type A requirements set by the Department of Agriculture, can be served at a cost of approximately 37 cents as compared to the 60 or 70 cents cost for present school lunches
