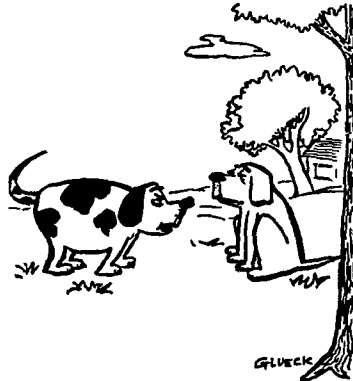
Farmers Have Picnic

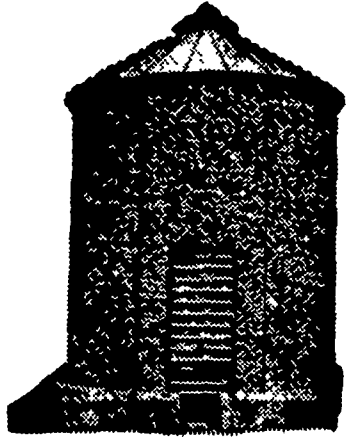

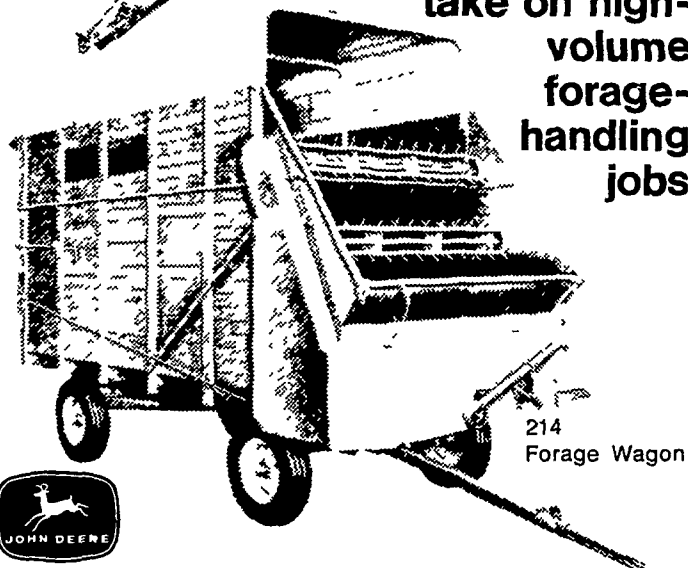

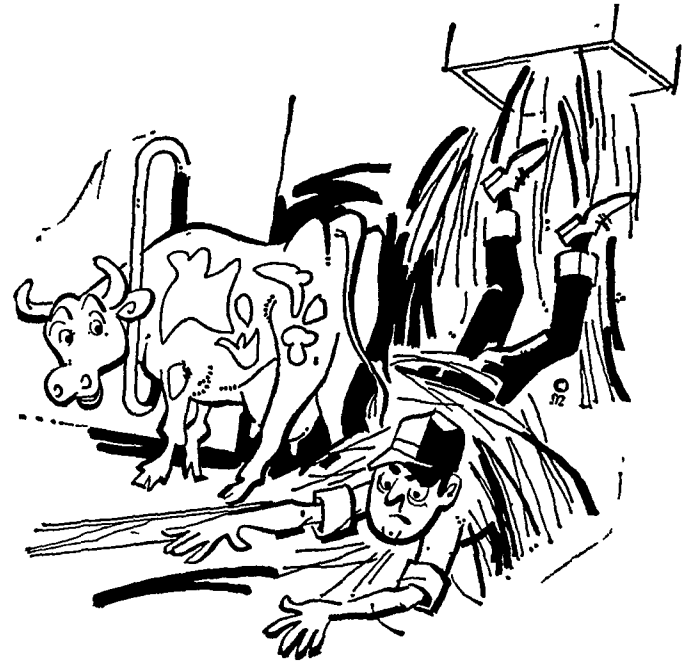
