Ready-to-cook movement improved in most quarters as buyers prepare for anticipated weekend needs, especially where limited feature activity involved. Slaughter schedules about normal at most plants. Less than trucklot prices unchanged on both plant and U.S. Grade A. Improved movement on legs tending to increase values however breasts failing to clear even at occasionally lower prices. Advance trading fair with early negotiations noted at 27 cents on Plant Grade loads. Live supplies ample. Undertone steady. Negotiated trucklot prices 2-3 pound ready-to-cook broilers/fryers for delivery next week:

What's New?

The New Holland division of Sperry Rand is promoting a its New Holland model 1010 Stack-liner automatic bale wagon.

Some features of the wagon, according to the company, include:

— Automatic pick-up of bales one at a time as the machine is driven along and building of a neat, tight load automatically on the load rack. Pick up time for a load is only five minutes.

— When loaded, the 1010 can travel at tractor road speed.

— With hydraulics doing all the work, the 1010 can be un-

loaded a bale at a time, from a level area and into an elevator. The process can be reversed by reloading a bale at a time from the elevator.

— A bale at a time can also be unloaded on-the-go along a level feed bunk or out in the pasture.

— Or the load can be stacked outside in a pole barn and later retrieved a full load at a time. This allows for feeding out a bale at a time or restacking the load at another area.

According to company information quoting users of the equipment, primary advantage is in saving labor.

Joe Colvin, West Chester, has 300 steers and about 3,000 bales of hay and 10,000 bales of straw last year, as well as 7,000 bales of corn fodder. Before he got the 1010 he hired a lot of boys in the summer, but he doesn't hire them anymore. One day last summer "I brought in from 1,100 to 1,200 bales," he noted.
