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Agricultural Progress Days to Attract Home Gardeners, Vegetable Growers

Home gardeners and commercial vegetable growers will find exhibits and demonstrations of special interest during Agricultural Progress Days at the Rock Springs Agricultural Research Center of The Pennsylvania State University August 31 through September 2.

Home gardeners will see a flower and vegetable garden — planted especially for the three day event The Research Center is located three miles west of Pine Grove Mills on Route 45

Wagon tours of research areas will be held daily The tours will show experiments with cultural methods, nutrition studies, weed control, and breeding and variety trials Ornamental plants, fruits, and vegetables will be featured.

September 1 has been designated as Horticulture Day Accordingly, officials of the Pennsylvania Vegetable Growers Association have planned a special field day for members — as part of Agricultural Progress Days Growers will be escorted on a wagon tour from 10 a.m. until noon The tour will include inspection of vegetable breeding programs, variety trials, weed control trials, and nutrition experiments. In case of rain, this tour will be held September 2

The afternoon programs on September 1 and 2 will demonstrate new cultural and harvesting systems This will include mulches, high density plantings,

and machine harvesting of cabbage.

Commercial equipment for planting, tilling, and harvesting vegetables will be on display the afternoons of September 1 and 2 Several machines will be shown.

Precision plantings of direct-seeded tomatoes, cucumbers, lettuce, and cabbage will be demonstrated by University personnel the afternoons of September

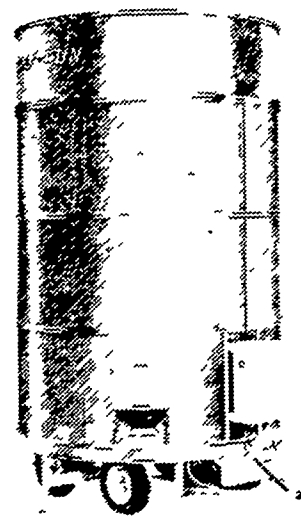
Rittersbach will issue a daily printed report which will be mailed upon request He will also make the reports available to the press

1 and 2. A cultural technique for close spacing of beans will also be shown. Visitors will see mulches used to produce melons, tomatoes, peppers, and eggplant

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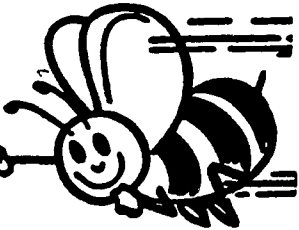
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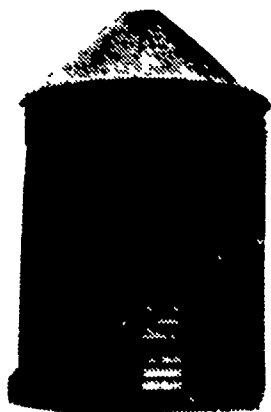
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
