

## Penn State to Help Upgrade Argentina's Agriculture

Agricultural education in Argentina entered 'a' new phase recently with the development of an agreement between three U. S. universities, including Pennsylvania State University, and the Graduate School for Agricultural Science at Castelar, Argentina.

The contract is designed to provide assistance to the academic growth of the Argentine institution through technical consultation, purchases of equipment, visual aids and library materials, and advanced degree training of Argentine faculty and students in U. S. Institutions. Financing is provided by the U.S. Agency for International Development (AID).

Penn State's specific academic

upgrading of the agricultural extension curriculum, and in initiating and developing programs in crop science. Present plans call for the assignment of the first Penn State faculty member to the Argentina project by January 1972, according to Dr. Robert E. Swope, Coordinator of International Programs for the College of Agriculture.

Short term consultants in specialized sub-disciplines of extension and agronomy will assist in the programs at periodic intervals.

Texas A and M University and Michigan State University are cooperating with Penn State in a consortium arrangement. Consultants will undertake similar, and parallel, activities at Castelar in areas of agricultural economics, animal science, and

## soil science.

The major goal of the graduate school at Castelar, which opened in 1968, is to serve qualified students from several South American countriesparticularly Brazil, Chile, Paraguay, Uruguay, and Argentina. The school is located at the National Cénter of Agricultural Research operated by INTA, the National Institute of Technical Agriculture, an agency of the Argentina Department of Agriculture.

The new contract represents a renewal of Penn State's earlier interest and involvement in Argentina agriculture.

Last year, College of Agriculture faculty members completed a five year program which provided assistance to fruit production research in the concentrated fruit area of the Rio Negro Valley

Richard Schulze, Representative for the 157th District, suggested the State House of Representatives be reduced to 160 members and the Senate to 40 at the Chester County Teen Retreat.

He further recommended these positions become full time jobs with adequate staff in order to make state government sound, responsible and sensitive to the people.


of Chester County 4-H Council, welcomed the group to the Retreat.


