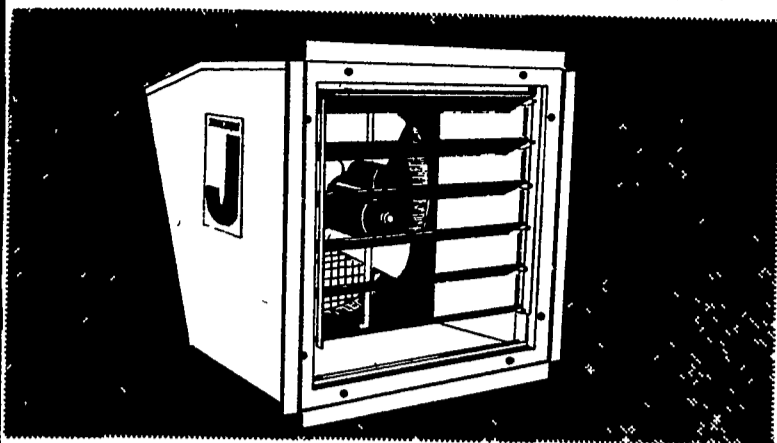

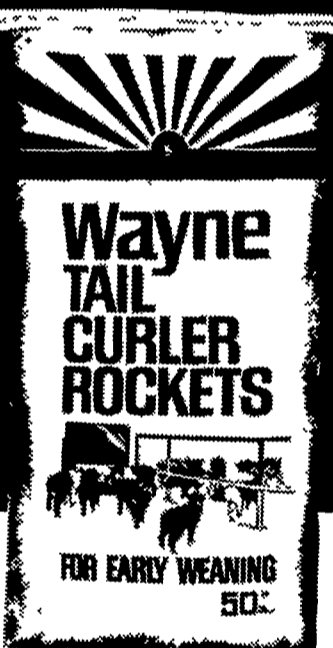

The process can be used to make wonderful gifts or a marvelous personalized decorative touch for the home.

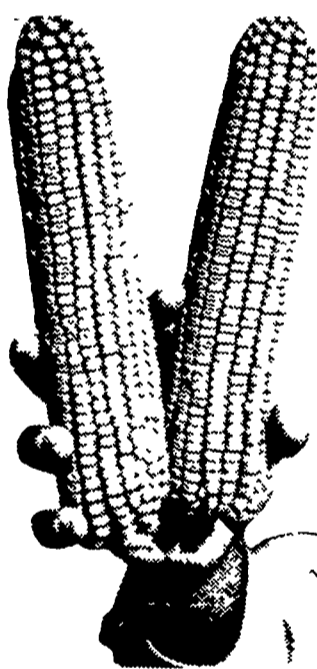
Nutrition Workshops Set
